# PWBA Unveils Full 2023 Regional Schedule and Showdown Format, Makes National Tour Updates 

Congratulations go out to Brandon Moore for winning his first SASBA tournament last weekend at J B's Allen Bowl. He teamed with Randy Summers, Jim Stephens, and Royce Rusher to win the 70/60/50/50 event.

Brandon has been knocking on the door and was able to cave it in by averaging over 247 for the 10 games... his whole team bowled great, but he certainly led the way. Steve Wright was high average in the tournament by knocking down two more pins than Moore did and his team came in second.

It was a pretty high scoring event as $26 \%$ of the field averaged over 230 and 9\% averaged under 200.

This was Stephens' 42th SASBA title putting him one ahead of Rick Minier's 41, but still behind the illustrious Bob McGregor with 47 titles.
"It's pretty amazing that I've won that many, but l've bowled a lot more tournaments than Bob ever did, so even if I was to pass him, he's still the greatest in my mind," said Stephens.

At any point, to become the winningest SASBA bowler ever is an ultimate accomplishment, regardless of how many tourna-
ments you bowl. It's not just about the wins and the money for him though, "I'm most proud of the close friends I've made since I turned 50, these are people that I didn't even know until that point. That's really the best part of bowling SASBA," added Stephens.

The 2023 PBA National tour starts on January 29th in Indianapol is with the US Open. This will be a very exciting season from a view ership standpoint.

The bowling fan is going to get the opportunity to see lots of "extra" bowling on national TV broadcasts. More matchplay, more qualifying, really, all of the bowling that we have always wanted to see will now be in focus. Should be very fun to watch.

The PBA tour will run pretty heavy every week through mid-May. I, for one, am really looking forward to seeing the best in the business do their thing.

The top 10 players have been largely unchanged for the last few years and I doubt anything will change this year. That is the only negative for me. I generally want to see the new up and coming player have

PWBA Regional Tour kicks off at JB's Allen Bowl Saturday, January 21

ARLINGTON, Texas - Professional Women's Bowling Association members planning on competing in regional tournaments this season can now fill in their calendars as the entire 2023 PWBA Regional schedule has been released.

The nine-event regional season will begin with the PWBA Greater Dallas Regional, which will be held at JB's Allen Bowl in Allen, Texas, on Jan. 21 and conclude at Highland Park Lanes in Greeley, Colorado, host of the PWBA Northern Colorado Regional on Nov. 11.

In between, the PW BA Regional Tour will make stops in Michigan, Washington, Ohio, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Illinois and Minnesota in an attempt to give female bowlers from all across the country

Those bowlers will be hoping to win titles and earn their way into the Regional Showdown, which will be held in December and serve as the official end to the 2023 PW BA Tour season.

Each regional champion will automatically be seeded for match play at the Regional Show down. The remaining
few weeks as they kick off their nine regional schedule at JB's Allen Bowl Saturday, J anuary 21. Non-titlist ladies from across the country are coming in to try to qualify for the year end PWBA Regional Showdown in December.

Come out and watch some amazing talent and bowl with the pros Saturday night. See JB's ad on page 5 for pro-am information.

The National tour schedule begins in early May in California and will move west through August with it's annual stop in Houston at the PBA/PW BA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles.
spots in the 16-person field will be aw arded based on the results of an eight-game qualifying round that will be open to all PW BA Regional-eligible bowlers.

The top 16 players will compete in round-robin match play before the field is cut to the final four bowlers for the stepladder finals.

Every player who qualifies for match play will cash at the Regional Showdown. If the number of entries is high enough, additional cash spots outside the top 16 will be paid at a ratio of 1:3 as is done for PW BA National Tour prize funds.

The winner of the 2023 Regional Showdown will not only receive a cash prize, but she will also have her entry fees covered for all 2024 PW BA National Tour singles events as well.

To be eligible to enter a PW BA Regional event, a female competitor must average at least 180. PW BA Tour national champions, regardless of membership status at the time of their win, will not be eligible to

compete in any PWBA Regional event.

The cost to enter a PW BA Regional event is $\$ 100$ for a member and $\$ 150$ for a non-member.
"The best way to continue growing the PW BA National Tour is by making sure that there are plenty of opportuni ties for bowlers to compete at the regional level," PW BA Players Committee Chairperson Bryanna Coté said. "Once players get a taste of professional competition through regionals, they feel more confident and better equipped to take the next step and eventually begin competing on the national tour."

Bowlers competing on the 2023 PW BA National Tour will be in store for some changes after the PW BA Players Committee voted to adjust Tour Championship eligibility rules and some of this year's event prize funds.

Per the Players Committee vote, spots in the 24-player Tour Championship field will now be reserved for PW BA members who win titles during the 2023 season (with the exception of the PBA/ PW BA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles) or who are high enough on the season points list at the conclusion of the second Classic Series event provided they have participated in a minimum of $50 \%$ of the season's tournaments.

Tour Championship competitors will participate in roundrobin match play with the top five bowlers advancing to the stepladder finals.

The Players Committee al so voted to approve an increase in the purse offered at the events comprising the Great Lakes Classic Series. The additional prize money will be moved from this season's three PW BA standard events.

All teams bowled nine traditional games to determine the advancers to the singleelimination Baker bracket. The men's division had 16 teams advance, and eight schools made the bracket in the women's division. All rounds featured a best-of-five Baker format.

Oklahoma Christian finished as the top qualifier in the men's division, posting a 9,455 total. Wichita State was second with 9,389, and Newman was third with 9,098. Saint Xavier was the final team to advance to the bracket, finishing in 16th place with 8,624 .

In the bracket, No. 4 Tennessee Southern and Wichita State were able to advance to the title match.

## Dombrowski Defeats Champion to Win 2022 PBA Regional Players Invitational

LAS VEGAS, NV - Patrick Dombrowski took the scenic route at the 2022 PBA Regional Players Invitational, but the final destination was worth the journey.

With a 267-259 victory over Colin Champion, he claimed the Walter Ray Williams Jr. Championship trophy and the \$16,000 top prize.

In the title match, Champion fired the first seven strikes. But Dombrowski, who began the match with a pair of single-pin spares, wasn't fazed.

Dombrowski struck on every shot from the third through ninth frame, waiting for an opportunity to sneak past the 30 -year-old Floridian.

That moment came when Champion left a 4-pin in the 8th and a flat-10 in the final frame. With a strike on his fill ball, Champion forced Dombrowski to strike for the title.

Just like the previous seven shots, Dombrowski aced it to claim his ninth career PBA Regional Tour title, this one coming at South Point Bowling Plaza in Las Vegas.

"I got the monkey off my back," Dombrowski said. "I finally won outside of the Central region. It feels really good."

After qualifying in 22nd place, Dombrowski had to battle through six rounds of match play to claim the title. In the first two rounds, each best-of-five matches, he defeated Nick Borgaro in five games and Michael Schlabach in four.

Those victories gave the Ohio native a berth in today's Round of 16, which is where bowed out of last year's RPI. He said a better understanding of

Hope you and yours had a happy start to 2023 and as you might expect, there is some bowling media news, so here we go.

One of the more well-known terrestrial bowling radio shows is returning as a podcast. The Spare Time Bowling Show, first profiled here ten years ago, formerly on Milwaukee's WSSP The Fan 105.7 FM until 2017, then 1250 AM until 2019 before format changes eliminated local programming, returned with weekly podcasts on Audacity started up the week of J anuary 4th.

Longtime Milwaukee sports talk host Steve "Sparky" Fifer remains as lead host along with former PBA Xtra Frame and FloBowling live stream announcer '\$2' Phil Brylow, and Spare Time Pro Shop ow ner Dwight Albrecht. In its hour-long radio format, the trio offered serious reporting of all three pro tours, local high school recaps, and interviews with many familiar names to fans all over the country.

Fifer isn't shy about asking tough questions, either, often grilling PBA Commissioner Tom Clark about PBA marketing and how the Association bonds with younger audiences. The new edition promises much of the same.

Since sports talk radio has become a more common radio format these days, show hosts have become as well-known as famed disc jockeys in music formats from the 1970s and 80s and interview skills of news
talk contemporaries. If you've never heard the show, some of the final WSSP The Fan ver sions of the show from 2019 are still posted on the show's Audacity page available here along with the new episode (https:// www.audacy.com/podcasts/ spare-time-bowling-20415).

## \#\#\#\#\#\#

Another former over the air bowling show turned podcast is the ending its decade-long run. The Bowlers Show original host and co-founder David Waswo posted on the show's Facebook page he was leaning toward ending the show. The show's most recent version, a YouTube live stream seen several Sundays a month, resumed last fall with new co-host Luke Rosdahl, who hosts his own YouTube ball review video podcast.

Around 2014, I was asked to contribute in one of the seg ments in between interviews with weekend tournamentwinning bowlers on their way home, often the Sunday PBA telecasts. Over time, it became just about every week appearances offering everything from weekend PBA regional tournament summaries to telecast critiques and in the fall, thoughts on our football teams, Waswo's Chiefs and my Steelers. After a while, I even got my own theme music to start segment, reading a forecast over the music ramp as though I was auditioning for Chicago's WLS-AM Radio, albeit in its MusicRadio era, something I had hoped of doing in my 80s

With TBN now a monthly publication, planning material for columns can be little tricky For example, in a weekly format, a lengthy interview with a name in the industry would have covered two straight weeks. But in a monthly format, I'm going to try something different. My chat with Norm Duke will be in smaller segments still allowing for mate rial of the day, like analysis of PBA television ratings to exist along-side of Duke's observations of a 40-year tour career Here's this month's installment of something I'm calling Norm's Nuggets. Over the next few months, you'll read about what he did to build his game from the early years to becoming a PBA champion to racking up forty titles, winning the last few well past the age of 50 .

From his first title forty years ago next month, the road to the second title was not as smooth.

Title number two was eight years after the first, while title number three was only four months later. Duke explained how he started to transform his game.
"I won my ninth tournament ever. What I didn't realize was my game was so one dimensional and that dimension worked that week. But then I learned if you're going to do this for a living with these prize funds, you have to be winnable a lot, not just pulling out checks. During those eight long years after winning that first title, I build the other dimensions, the B, C, D, E games.

That was the answer to give me the most versatile game bowling has ever seen."
"If I'm throwing it straight and am the third best straight player on the floor, that was ok. If I'm the third best hook player on the floor the next day when the boomers have got it, take the lead and I never lead a day, that's how I looked at it. At all times you will be playing against the straightees who are better than you and that's all they do. Then the following day, you'll be hooking the ball against the best hook ball players in the world. You're not going to beat them every time, but over a five day period when you get lane changes and with all the different variables in play, that versatility I
recognized was my way. That is your mechanism. You don't have to win every day, just be in the top ten every day," Duke explained.

Sounds simple, doesn't it? But what Duke didn't mention is having the skill set to pull it off.

I crossed next to him at a few tour stops back then and it was see his attention to detail and focus on the task of the day without burying himself in paralysis by analysis. That is one true sign of an all-time great.

#  <br> A Legend Lives On 

Dave Davis, one of the first left-handers to find success on the Professional Bowlers Association (PBA) tour, has died at the age of 80, at his home in Lake Placid, Florida. His smooth delivery and personality were emulated by many lefties, but perhaps most notably by Parker Bohn III.
"Dave was an extreme influence on me," said Bohn in an article posted by Johnny Campos of the PBA. "He and his wife took me under their arm and tried to show me the difference betw een right and wrong on the lanes. Back then they formulated my game to what it has become today."

Indeed. A nyone that watches Parker Bohn III in action today can immediately recognize the approach that's so reminiscent of Hall of Fame bowler Davis. Their styles were almost identical according to Larry Lichstein, himself a lefty, and the PBA Director of Player Services for many years. "Dave was just so elegant and wonderful to watch that even right-handers couldn't knock him," said Larry.
Remembering Dave Davis and Saratoga Lanes

My first encounter with Dave Davis was during my high school days in Sebastopol, California. Even though it was a school night, my parents agreed to let me accompany a couple of my bowling buddies and one of their parents for the two-hour drive south to Saratoga Lanes in San Jose, where our chaperone would be bowling in the Pro-Am event on Tuesday night.

Davis was already a fan favorite at this early point in his career, with a jovial personality that played well with the crowd. I remember our chaperone didn't bowl that well, so we all called our parents to see if we could stay a little longer while he bowled the 11:00 p.m. squad. Needless to say, we didn't get home until about 4:00 a.m., and I have no idea how I made it through the next day at school.

I must have been on my best behavior all week because my parents allowed me to go with the same group for the final block of match play competition that Friday night. I had never seen a three-game set totaling

800, so you can imagine my great pleasure when for the first three games that night professional bowlers Bob Strampe, Dick Ritger and Jim Stefanich all totaled 800 or more. What a great experience.

It wasn't until a few years later that the lefty-righty controversy had reached a fever pitch and the top 16 bowlers at Saratoga Lanes were all left-handed. The next week, as the story goes, the PBA had a Iane man that traveled with the tour. Lenny Nicholson and Sam Baca were the first to perform the task of lane maintenance supervisors, and their responsibility in a nutshell was to keep the 'dominance' of lefty scores in check on a percentage basis.

The date of that eventful telecast from Saratoga Lanes on the ABC Television Network was February 6, 1971. It was the Ebonite Open and featured Earl Anthony, John Petraglia, Skee Foremsky, Larry Lichstein and Dave Davis in the stepladder finals. Lichstein defeated Davis in the final match by a score of 234 to 227 . It turned out to be Lichstein's only PBA title. During the telecast, famed analyst Billy Welu commented: "The greatest coverage in bowling history was experienced this week because the top 16 were all left-handed."

Davis and Soutar Overcome the Lefty-Righty Controversy

One of the strangest relationships that existed on the pro tour during those years was the bond between veteran righthander Dave Soutar and Dave Davis. "The main reason we got together was that I signed with Brunswick in '71," said Soutar during the Campos interview. The two spent about a month in Europe that summer doing exhibitions. "That's when we started rooming together and it never changed."
"In those days, all the right-handers were against left-handers," said Soutar.
"But I was never mad about it. That's probably why we could room together." Davis once beat Soutar for the title at the PBA Canadian Open, but a few years later Soutar turned the tables, beating Davis twice in a single month for titles.

Dave and wife Judy Soutar, also a longtime member of the Brunswick Advisory Staff, live

near Lake Placid and were able to visit with Davis and wife Joann during his final days. "We talked and laughed with them about the good old days," said Judy. It was during those good old days that Davis first met 'bowling groupie' J oann at the pro stop on Long Island (Garden City Bowl), in 1975. "He called me the next week and I hung up because I didn't think it was him. Then it went on from there. We got married in 1977."

A Trailblazer for Future Left-handers

Dave Davis had a lot of firsts on the tour. "The new bowlers of today have no idea who he was," said Lichstein. "He was the first left-hander to win a major, then two majors, and then Player of the Year in 1967. He was the youngest player to win three majors when he won the Firestone Tournament of Champions at the age of 25 ." Davis was inducted into the PBA Hall of Fame in 1978, and the USBC Hall of Fame in 1990 Bohn remembers that the best part about his relationship with Davis was that he owned a bowling center in New Jersey about 30 minutes from his home in Jackson. "I was 16 turning 17 when I met Davis - way before my pro career. It was a dream of mine to bowl on the PBA Tour."

I remember Bohn from those early years while I was working for AMF in New York. Whenever I was at home for a weekend and there was a

How much you walk in the direction of your projection depends on that projection. You cannot walk straight with the boards and send the ball to the outside without affecting your armswing. (You can always walk straight. It's just not straight with the boards). Walk your lines. It's essential to keeping your armswing in the groove and next to your body to enable you to make the shot you intend.

runner-up finishes, he said. He qualified fourth at the RPI and earned a two-round bye. But to reach the finals, a pair of southpaws in Jean Perez and Graham Fach stood in his path. Perez and Fach had been striking seemingly at-will, but the right-handed Champion knew they weren't invincible.
"W hen (the left-handers) started to bowl on the same pair continuously, they were forced to move," he said. "So I knew against Perez, if I could at least win one of the first two games, I was going to have a good chance in the third one." In the semifinals, Champion would only have one game to knock off Fach. He dispatched the 11-time regional titleist with a 248-221 victory, marking Fach's second consecutive
a 10 pin, you don't line up on the left side of the lane and walk toward the 7 pin and then throw your arm out to the right toward the 10 pin. You open your body toward the 10 pin and then walk a path parallel to a ball path projection across 20, for example, to make the spare. It is not a very steep angle. You'll end up at the foul line a couple of boards right of where you started; say start 35, slide 33 or so.

I believe walking to the middle of the lane is the \#1
semifinal exit at the RPI.
Entering the 10th frame against Dombrowski, with both players sitting on max scores of 279, Champion felt his ball motion starting to go away.
"I knew I needed to make a move," said Champion, who works at Tom Daugherty's pro shop in Florida. "I moved half a board left, which is what I've been making all week, and trusted it. I threw a good shot, it just wasn't meant to be I guess."

Dombrowski enters the 2023 season with the validation that he can win outside of his home turf. The next tournament on his calendar: the U.S. Open at the end of the month.

reason for missed 10 pins. Your walk angle is much less severe than your ball path angle. On the approach, even if you start on the back row of dots, you are only about 15 feet from the foul line. So, the angle you walk in those 15 feet is much less severe than the angle you are playing on the lane. That angle on the lane is four times longer ( 15 feet of approach and more than 60 feet of lane).

Fun fact - The angle from the 39th board at the foul line to the 10 pin is less than 3 degrees!

all followed unique paths in order to earn that opportunity Breanna Clemmer of Clover, South Carolina, and J akob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, claimed spots by winning their respective divisions during Team USA Trials competition, which consisted of 30 games bowled over the course of five days across five challenging oil patterns.

Clemmer, a 25 -year-old right-hander who competes as a member of the Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour, averaged 221.5 per game for the week and finished in the daily top three during four of the five qualifying rounds to best a field of 149 women.

Butturff averaged 232.2 and collected two first-place finishes and a third-place effort enroute to topping the 174 -player men's field.

Jillian Martin of Stow, Ohio, and Brandon Bohn of Jackson, New Jersey, also earned titles Saturday night, and they made some history in the process.

Martin and Bohn, both just 18 years old, were crow ned the nation's top amateur bowlers by winning their respective divisions at the 2023 National Amateur Bowling Championships, which was contested simultaneously with Team USA Trials using the same qualifying scores.

Martin and Bohn earned the top step on the podium after emerging victorious from stepladder finals competition that featured the top three players from each U.S. Amateur division.

In addition to the Team USA Trials and U.S. A mateur champions, six other players earned automatic berths on Team USA 2023 based on their strong performance at Gold Coast this week.

Throughout the event, players earned ranking points based on where they finished in the daily standings. The leader each day received one point, second place earned two points and so on, with the lowest number of points after the five six-game blocks determining the 2023 Team USA Trials men's and women's champion.

Butturff, a six-time winner and major champion on the Professional Bowlers Association tour, took home the Team USA Trials crown for the second time in his career - he also won the event in 2017.

The 28-year-old left-hander was even more impressive this time around, how ever collecting two squad victories, averaging five pins higher per game and lowering his winning ranking-point total from 59 to
44.

Butturff's closest pursuers were Brandon Bonta of Wichita, Kansas (58), A.J. Johnson of Osw ego, Illinois (62) and Matthew Russo of Ballwin, Mis souri (80). Those three players joined Butturff in earning automatic spots on Team USA.

By earning a spot on this year's team, Butturff will be celebrating seven consecutive years donning the red, white and blue on the lanes; it's not an honor he takes for granted.
"Winning Team USA Trials is just as difficult as winning a title on the PBA Tour, and it's honestly better because it earns you the opportunity to represent your country while doing what you love," Butturff said. "Winning here is one of the best accomplishments a bowler can put on his or her resume. For me to be able to win it tw ice is really special."

Clemmer's 2023 victory was her first at Team USA Trials: nevertheless, she found the accomplishment no less fulfilling
"I have a friend who always tells me that I'm the best in the world, but I never really believed it because I always felt like other people were better; I was just here. Now, to win a tournament like this among the best of the best, I'm starting to believe it," Clemmer said "A tournament like this is just amazing to win. I don't even think I can really describe how I feel right now other than that I'm just really happy."

One of the many things Clemmer is happy about is that she will now have the opportunity to celebrate her tenth year as a member of the Team USA family.

Her international career began with a stint on Junior Team USA from 2014 to 2018. She then made the leap to the adult team in 2019, and she's been a contributor on that level ever since.

This week's victory at Team Trials felt like a fitting next step in Clemmer's career arc as she just seems to be getting better and better with each tournament she bowls.

In an event that tests the versatility and patience of even the most seasoned veterans, Clemmer appeared to be in complete control

She notched second-place finishes on each of the first two days before taking a small step back with a 24th-place effort in Round 3. She came back strong from there, however, winning Day 4 and collecting a thirdplace finish during Round 5 to establish a winning total of just 32 points.

Jordan Richard of Maumee, Ohio, and Jillian Martin of Stow, Ohio, finished with 54 points each, which was enough to guarantee both spots on

Team USA 2023
The final guaranteed position went to 2022 PWBA Rookie of the Year Olivia Farwell of Elizabethtown, Pennsylvania. Farwell finished with 84 points to secure her first invitation to bowl as a member of Team USA.

Martin and Bohn came into the week already having secured spots on Junior Team USA 2023 based on their outstanding performances at the Junior Gold Championships in Grand Rapids, Michigan in July.

Nevertheless, as the two took to the lanes for their respective U.S. Amateur title matches, it was clear that they had adult team aspirations in mind.

Bohn advanced to the title tilt by defeating Team USA veteran John Janawicz of Winter Haven, Florida, 268-212 during the opening match of the stepladder finals.

Bohn's pace slowed a bit during the championship round against top seed Brandon Bonta of Wichita, Kansas, but that was likely due to the final match being contested on the most difficult oil pattern the 2023 Team USA Trials had to offer.

As such, Bohn couldn't recreate the striking power he displayed during his nine-strike victory over J anawicz; nevertheless, he stayed clean, threw a pair of doubles and delivered the mark he needed in the 10th frame to defeat Bonta 211-199 and become the 2023 U.S. Amateur champion.
"I wanted to have a good showing to show people that I belong here, that this is the place for me, but other than that I didn't really have a whole lot of expectations," Bohn said. "To win this and be on the adult team is surreal; I really don't have words for it other than to say that I couldn't have done it without all of the amazing people that I have supporting me."

Martin had plenty of fans cheering her on as well, but that's hardly surprising as she has been a fixture on the elite bowling scene for several years now despite being just 18 years old.

As the women's top seed for the U.S. A mateur stepladder, Martin only needed to win one game in order to take the title.

That game was against Mary Orf of St. Louis, and it was an entertaining game throughout.

Orf stayed clean early and took advantage of a M artin open to establish a 13-pin lead through six frames.

It wouldn't last, how ever, as Orf opened after leaving a 4-6 split in the eighth frame. Martin, meanwhile, followed up a seventh-frame strike with two

more in the eighth and ninth to go around Orf and complete a 199-170 comeback victory.

For Martin, the win was more than just another title; it was a stepping stone that helped her realize a dream that she's been pursuing for quite some time.
"Being on Team USA has been a goal of mine for a while now, so I'm really grateful to make it in my first year out here being eligible," Martin said. "I don't really think that it's hit me yet that I'm the U.S A mateur champion, but it ranks right up there next to being a PW BA champion.

Since the U.S. A mateur champion is automatically placed on Team USA, M artin didn't need the spot that she earned by virtue of her thirdplace finish in the Team Trials field.

As such, that spot was then passed along to the next-highest finisher, who in this case was current Team USA member Bryanna Coté of Tucscon, Arizona.

In addition to the bowlers who earned automatic invitations to join the adult team, two men and three women
were selected by the National Selection Committee based on their performances at the 2023 Team USA Trials.

Andrew Anderson of Holly, Michigan, and J anawicz will join the men's team while Mabel Cummins of Hermitage, Tennessee, Rebecca Hagerman of Loves Park, Illinois, and Orf had their names added to the women's roster.

The National Selection Committee also selected five men and five women to join Team USA 2023 based on submitted resumes.

The men's team selections included Kristopher Prather of Romeoville, Illinois; Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, North Carolina; Chis Via of Blacklick, Ohio; Nick Pate of Ballwin, Missouri; and 2022 Team USA Trials champion Darren Tang of Las Vegas.

The National Selection Committee's additions to the women's team were Danielle McEwan of Stony Point, New York; Julia Bond of Lincoln, Nebraska; Stephanie Zavala of Downey, California; Lauren Pate of Ballwin, Missouri; and Shannon Pluhowsky of Dayton,

## Troy Lint Claims 2022 PBA50 Regional Players Invitational

LAS VEGAS, NV - For the fourth time this season, Troy Lint left the lanes with a trophy in his hand. This time, he exited South Point Bowling Plaza holding the Walter Ray Williams Jr. Championship trophy as the winner of the 2022 PBA50 Regional Players Invitational.

Lint earned his fourth regional title of the season and the $\$ 10,000$ top prize. Though the 54 -year-old only joined the PBA three years ago, this victory marked the seventh of his career.

Lint's first title came in a 2020 PBA 50/ PBA60 doubles tournament. His partner was Darryl Bower, the same man he defeated in this afternoon's title match 246-237.
"Bowling against him meant more than you can imagine," Lint said. "He's my doubles partner. I hate bowling against him. He's a legend in Pennsylvania - he's a legend, period."
"If I couldn't win it, I'm just as happy for Troy," said Bower, who previously won the RPI in

1983 and 1985. "I didn't expect to win, but just as a tradition to come out and be a part of this tournament again means something to me."

Lint bow led exceptionally all tournament - he never shot a game below 200 - but he was particularly dominant on fresh oil. In Lint's five games on the fresh, he averaged more than 260, including a 300 in the first game of the tournament.

He said the pattern allowed him to utilize his power and take advantage of the shim. He used a combination of urethane and reactive throughout the tournament.

Lint could only think of one word to describe the feeling: incredible. He reflected on how he arrived at this stage in his bowling career.
"A really good friend of mine, Mike Markis, passed away (in April of 2021)," Lint said. "If it wasn't for Mike, I wouldn't be bowling in the PBA. I had no interest - and now it's all I care about.
"This win is setting my future plans in motion. I'm

bowling everything."

In the semifinals, Lint, Bower, Rick Meneley and Brian Kretzer each opened with at least five strikes in a row. The scorching start ended with Meneley leaving a pocket 7-10 in the 6th frame, followed quickly by a wrap-10 from Kretzer.

Lint's string lasted one more frame before sparing the 4-7, but a second open frame from Meneley in the 8th gave Lint all the cushion he needed. Bower continued striking all the way to the 10th where a pesky $10-$ pin ended his bid for 300 . He had more than enough to defeat Kretzer, who struggled with untimely pin carry.

In the Round of 8, Lint took the lead over top qualifier Bill Watson with a 280 in Game 1 - bringing his three-game total on the fresh to 803 - but Watson battled back to take Game 2. Lint fired seven of the first eight strikes to take Game 3, 249-215, ending the top seed's run.

Kretzer's opening match highlighted the Round of 16. He took a 1-0 lead over Mitch Beasley, who earned the No. 2 seed in qualifying. Beasley fell behind 1-0, but came back to take a 2-1 advantage with the help of a 300 in Game 3.

Beasley had a chance to take the match in Game 4, but w rapped a 10 -pin and then left a stone-9 on his fill ball to lose a single pin. Kretzer advanced with a 218-200 win in Game 5.

semi-professional event being promoted by Mark Brenner, I would try to participate. Parker was a member of the organization and was dominant in those days. He was a cocky kid that was very confident of his ability... a similar attribute that I noticed in a youthful Marshall Holman about a decade earlier. Parker's approach was so much like that of Dave Davis. He was a clone.

Bohn has gone on to achieve more PBA titles than Davis, with 35 on the regular tour and another 10 on the senior circuit. But perhaps none of that would have been possible without the trailblazing efforts of Davis on behalf of all left-handed bowlers. W hat an idolized character Mr. Davis must have been in the life of Parker Bohn III.
"It truly hurts," said Bohn. "We truly lost a living legend, a gentleman. He was one of the kindest individuals that you could ever meet, on and off the Ianes."
