## O'Keefe Rallies to Win 2021 PWBA Bowlers Journal Classic

ARLINGTON, Texas - In case anyone had questions about how the events of the last year affected Shannon O'Keefe and her momentum on the Professional Women's Bowling


Association Tour, the two-time reigning PWBA Player of the Year offered a quick reminder that she's still the player to beat by winning the 2021 Bowlers Journal Classic, the first event of the new season.

It also was fitting that the title match Thursday night at the International Training and Research Center featured the tour's top two players - O'Keefe and top seed Danielle McEwan of Stony Point, New York - in another epic showdown.

O'Keefe, of Shiloh, Illinois, bounced back from a second-frame split and closed the title tilt with eight consecutive strikes to defeat her longtime Team USA teammate, 243-225. The win was the 14th of O'Keefe's career and earned her a \$10,000 top prize.

The Bowlers Journal Classic was the first event of the PWBA Kickoff Classic Series, which will feature three national tour stops and one regional event during its seven-day run at the Continued on Page 4

## Anthony Simonsen Rolls 279 to Advance to PBA Players Championship Finals

Jupiter, Fla.—Anthony Simonsen earned a berth in the PBA Players Championship Finals by winning the West Region with a 279 game over fifth-seeded Kris Koeltzow, who averaged 263 in his prior three matches to earn a spot in the final match.

"I had two game plans coming in and it was a matter of which one I was more comfortable with," said Simonsen.

"Because of the way Kris was bowling and his obviously high scoring pace, I thought I was going to have to bowl a really big game, which is why I chose to throw it straighter. I felt like it gave me a little more miss room, at least to the left."

Simonsen, who earned the top seed by leading the West Region through 28 games of qualifying, struck 11 times in the final match, only failing

to do so in the third frame. Unlike Koeltzow's previous three opponents, who elected for Koeltzow to open the match, Simonsen opted to start.

"I want to strike first," said Simonsen. "To me, it doesn't matter how many shows I make, the first strike is the hardest one. Once I get the first one, I can settle in, and I was fortunate for it to work out."

One positive outcome of the COVID-19 virus, if you can call anything related to the epidemic that infiltrated our shores constructive, would be the additional amount of time that we have had to reflect upon our lives and our surroundings.

In my own personal life, I have been provided with a tremendous amount of free time, since most of my bowling center clients have been greatly compromised by local governments in their ability to operate their business.

as well.

**Guaranteed Rate first** jumped into sports advertising buying time on the Super Bowl 50 telecast in 2016. Later that August, the Chicago White Sox announced a deal renaming its ballpark from the original name of Comiskey Park to "Guaranteed Rate Field" through the 2029 season.

Although not the first nonbowling title sponsor (Lumber Liquidators, Denny's), the press release found elsewhere in TBN states the deal also includes "... an array of exclusive marketing and opportunities to connect the brand even further with the PBA Tour, its fans, and events.'

One thing Guaranteed Rate undoubtedly looked at was TV viewership demographics to see exactly who is watching, allowing them to develop a marketing plan to make as many positive impressions as possible. As we've seen starting with the 2020 PBA World Championship as one of the final events before the March COIVD shutdown, advertising signage was plentiful where audience was previously, offering plenty of space and time to show off those positive impressions.

Denny's was a brand known well before sponsoring the PBA Tour, Lumber Liquidators was not so much. It did become

more so afterward, growing to a point where the brand wasn't renewed and went up the theoretical sports hierarchy ladder to a higher profile sports

Although not a title sponsor, Barbasol sponsored several PBA tournaments including the Players Championship and **Tournament of Champions** before moving on to moving its advertising to major teams'

One huge plus for Guaranteed Rate is it already is a known entity well outside the PBA, so I'm curious what other image positioning (signage, commercials, and other) is in store. We'll probably get a good idea with the regional finals of the PBA Players Championships the next few Sundays on FS1. Don't be totally surprised or offended if it looks different compared to what we're used to seeing.

The advantage for the PBA is this is a chance for it to take a few steps of its own back up the sports advertising hierarchy ladder to where it was decades ago on ABC. Keep in mind, sports marketing and television rights fee structures which used to be the main revenue stream is now part of several revenue streams with potentially more money for the prize fund and The Association.

Finally, this week, a note to longtime Texas Rangers fans who recall their early years at

the original ballpark in Arlington, old Arlington Stadium. One visiting ballplayer hit only .167, 5 for 30, in his appearances over nine games and two seasons. Among those five hits were three singles, a double, and a three-run homer. But that 1975 home run was the 737 th of his legendary career.

For younger Ranger fans, Henry Aaron played his final two seasons with the Milwaukee Brewers, ending in the same city where his original team, the Braves, called home for the first twelve seasons of his 23 MLB seasons.

Aaron was not known as a bowler, but did so for charity events, like Pittsburgh Pirate Willie Stargell's annual fundraiser for Sickle Cell Anemia research. In the photo seen here in the November 1973 fundraiser in Pittsburgh, pictured are three Baseball Hall of Famers and legends in their home cities, Stargell, Aaron, and Baltimore Oriole pitcher Jim Palmer.

**Another Aaron memory** comes from writer and author George Plimpton, who wrote several books and articles about being an active athlete in various sports. "Paper Lion" was his most notable book about being a quarterback for the Detroit Lions in preseason

Plimpton wrote articles for Sports Illustrated in that 1973 off season describing Aaron's life in a bubble one homer shy of Babe Ruth's record. At a February 1983 appearance at my alma mater, St. Cloud State University, I asked Plimpton about what it was really like that winter. First after giving me a look of surprise a college student would ask such a question about something that occurred nearly a decade earlier when that student was in grade school, his face turned somber then explained how strained Aaron became from receiving hundreds of thousands of pieces of mail of love and hate, spending much of the 1973 season apart from teammates due to death threats.

We've learned since how strained Aaron became that off season in preceding years, but Plimpton was first to break that angle of the story. I wish I was able to record a formal interview, but he requested no local media coverage that night, appearing as a favor to a professor on campus. This is what I remember from our exchange.

It was simply unspeakable what he went through. Although the mail was fairly even, he took the amount of hate mail pretty hard, keeping a lot of it. Don't get me wrong, he was very appreciative of the support on the cusp of breaking Continued on Page 3

Making his TV finals debut, Koeltzow climbed the stepladder from the fifth position, knocking out Darren Tang, Jakob Butturff and Wesley Low Jr. along the way. Koeltzow put up scores of 269, 268 and 254 before rolling a 205 against Simonsen.

"I'm happy to be back bowling, especially for a major, and I put a lot of practice in," said Simonsen. "Something clicked a couple days before the qualifying rounds and I've been really comfortable since."

Simonsen is the first player to advance to the PBA Players Championship Finals, which will feature the winners from all five regions competing for a major championship title and a top prize of \$250,000. Simonsen will be attempting to win his third career major title and second Players Championship,





person to claim a championship trophy, which she did at the 2019 PWBA Tour Championship for her third career major title. That victory was the final piece of a five-win season that included her second consecutive PWBA Player of the Year Award.

In both 2018 and 2019, McEwan was the runner-up in the player-of-the-year race, and she has been among the top five on the PWBA Tour's points list each year since the organization's relaunch in 2015.

During the same span, McEwan has collected five PWBA Tour titles, one in each of her five seasons, and her success includes two major victories. Her first win, also her first major, came at the 2015 PWBA Tour Championship, the last PWBA event to be held at the ITRC.

The Hall of Fame Classic will feature the week's top 24 performers, based on their 18-game pinfall totals from the **Bowlers Journal Classic and** ITRC Classic. Each event also will feature a different lane condition.

The prize fund for each of the three national tour stops will be \$65,000, with \$10,000 going to each champion.

The 2021 PWBA Tour season will feature 20 events, highlighted by the introduction of the Classic Series events and an increase in the season's overall prize fund by nearly \$400,000.



With all of this free time that I have been provided, I've had an opportunity to do some things that I've wanted to do for years, including cleaning out an accumulation of over 50 years of documents and old clothing. And yet, every time I throw away an article of clothing or an old file, I immediately regret discarding that item!

Another opportunity that I have had during the past year is to enjoy all of God's creatures great and small that surround us in our daily lives. I am reminded of my childhood in the tiny town of Sebastopol, Calif., when nature was all around me in our small farm of one acre within the city limits. We had almost every type of fruit or vegetable that you could imagine, including but not limited to corn, carrots, tomatoes, lettuce, cherries, apples, peaches, and just about any other seed that you care to place in the ground.

We also had an incredible amount of wildlife on that property, including an all-time high count of eighteen cats, before neutering of pets became the norm. A funny story that comes to mind and revolves around those cats involves my Mom's interest in almost any living creature. When I had reached the age of ten. she decided to return to college and pursue a degree in Zoology.


