Deo Benard Wins Second PBA Regional Title in Odessa Southwest Open

Odessa, Texas, (October 20, 2020) – Seventeen year old Deo Benard, of Henderson, Nev., won his second PBA Regional Title at the third annual PBA Odessa Southwest Super Open at Diamond Lanes on Sunday.

Benard battled fellow teen, sixteen year old Eric Jones, from Edmond, Okla., for the lead throughout the qualifying rounds before overtaking him in the match play finals. Benard held an 84 pin lead going into the final game position round, and sealed the victory defeating Jones, 240-202, to claim the \$5,000 first-place prize.

RENO, Nev. – Shannon Pluhowsky of Dayton, Ohio, captured her second major title, and first since 2006, in a dominating performance Sunday at the 2021 Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour Championship.

The 39-year-old left-hander defeated Bryanna Coté of Tucson, Arizona, 244-178 to claim the final major of the 2021

PWBA Tour season. Pluhowsky earned \$50,000 for the victory, and Coté collected \$25,000 for her runner-up finish.

The stepladder finals of the Tour Championship were broadcast live from the National Bowling Stadium on CBS Sports Network.

Pluhowsky's last win came at the 2006 United States Bowling Congress Queens, which

There are 13 regular season Tour events of which five are major championships, each awarding \$100,000 first-place prizes, with the Playoffs winner also collecting \$100,000, for a record six events paying six-figure first prizes. In total, players will be vying for a season purse of approximately \$4 million.

That is awesome...six tournaments that pay \$100k.

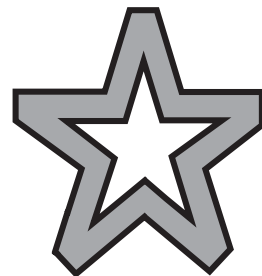

In the title match, Pluhowsky built the early advantage after connecting for four consecutive strikes, beginning in the second frame. Côté left back-to-back splits the first two times she bowled on

the left lane and was unable to convert either. She struggled to find a consistent look on that lane to get back into the match, and Pluhowsky filled frames to pull away.

Pluhowsky, the No. 2 seed, looked comfortable under the bright lights in both of her wins Sunday. She started

her semifinal match against Latvia's Diana Zavjalova with 10 consecutive strikes, before a 6 pin ended her bid at a perfect game. It would've been the sixth 300 game during the championship round of a PWBA Tour event.

Pluhowsky averaged 266.5 on Sunday, defeating Zavjalova, 289-199.

"They were a little differ-

ent, which typically happens on TV," Pluhowsky said. "My ball reps told me to bowl my A game. I was able to throw it a little harder, so I could stay a little closer to it, and it worked out. I caught a couple lucky breaks, and you need that to win. I've had some bad luck on TV, but today was different."

Pluhowsky has been a top

Bond Captures Third Title of 2021 in Dramatic Finish at PWBA Pepsi Classic

RENO, Nev. – Julia Bond of Aurora, Illinois, concluded the championship match at the Professional Women's Bowling Association Pepsi Classic with six consecutive strikes to win her third career title in an intense finish Thursday at the National Bowling Stadium.

The 25-year-old right-hander was trailing throughout the match against Colombia's Maria José Rodriguez and recorded the victory after Rodriguez left a devastating 7-10 split to start her final frame, 234-222.

Bond collected the \$10,000 top prize for her third win of the 2021 PWBA Tour season. The Pepsi Classic was broadcast live on BowlTV.com.

In the title tilt, Bond fell behind early after she was unable to convert a 3-6-10 combination in the second frame. Rodriguez built her lead on the strength of six strikes through the first

eight frames, and a spare in the ninth frame gave her the opportunity to lock out Bond in the 10th to secure her third PWBA Tour title.

Bond finished the match first, and her final three strikes forced Rodriguez to roll a strike on her first delivery for the chance to win the title. A nine count on the first offering from Rodriguez opened the door for the chance at a tie, if she converted the spare and rolled a strike on her fill ball.

"I'm very proud of the way I finished that match," Bond said. "I think it shows who I am as a person. I don't care if I'm losing or down, I'm always going to attempt to throw a great shot, because every shot holds the same importance for me.

"This win makes me happy. It makes me feel like I'm where I'm supposed to be. I've learned a lot, and I'm continuing to learn, which makes me excited.

There are things I still need to get better at and things I'm still learning, but being able to apply those things and succeed makes me excited for the future."

Bond won three matches in the stepladder and averaged 231 on her way to the title. She defeated Stefanie Johnson of McKinney, Texas, in Thursday's opening game, 203-192, and rolled eight strikes to defeat Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, California, 256-220, to advance to the finals.

The championship pair did provide Bond with some initial trouble, however, since the ball that helped her make her fourth championship-round appearance of the season did not give her the best look.

She also made a ball change at the end of the game against Johnson and felt she was making the right choices, while trying to think ahead for her remaining matches.

"We knew what looked good based on qualifying and match play, but it didn't look great on the TV pair," said Bond, who

Team USA Set to Depart for IBF Super World Championships in Dubai

ARLINGTON, Texas - Though the formats may be a little different in 2021, Team USA's goal for the upcoming International Bowling Federation Super World Championships is unchanged, and that is to win as many medals as possible against the best bowlers in the world.

Eight members of the team are hours away from departing for Dubai, United Arab Emirates, where competitors from dozens of countries will meet to compete for medals in singles, doubles, trios, mixed team and team competition.

The IBF Super World Championships will be the first of three events being held at the Dubai International Bowling Center, taking place from Nov. 6-15, and it will be followed by the inaugural IBF Para Bowling World Championships and the IBF Masters (formerly Senior) World Championships.

IBF will provide livestream coverage of each event at strike-

cloud.com, and results will be available at bowling.sport.

The list of women selected to represent the United States at the Super World Championships includes a quartet of world champions - Kelly Kulick of Union, New Jersey; Danielle McEwan of Stony Point, New York; Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, California; and Jordan Richard of Maumee, Ohio.

Kulick picked up the first of her five titles at the event in 1999, while McEwan is the defending singles champion. Parkin and Richard will look to defend the trios crown they claimed in 2019 with Liz Kuhlkin.

The men's team will include three world champions and a first-timer - Andrew Anderson of Holly, Michigan; Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona; AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois; and Kristopher Prather of Plainfield, Illinois.

Butturff and Johnson helped Team USA to the team gold medal at the 2017 World Cham-

pionships, and Anderson was a trios gold medalist at the 2018 World Men's Championships.

Prather made his Team USA debut at the recent PANAM Bowling Elite Championships in Colombia and picked up a pair of medals, including gold in the team event. Anderson also was one of the six Team USA men in Colombia.

"It's always an honor to bowl with the USA on your back, and even though I didn't have the best week in Colombia, it was really cool to be a part of the team gold medal and see the other guys do so well, especially the ones getting to experience it for the first time," Anderson said. "Now, we're going to shift gears and make the 15-hour flight to Dubai for the World Championships. Even though the stage may be different, the goal is the same, and that is to win the team gold medal, along with as many medals as possible along the way."

The Team USA men had a heartbreaking loss to Italy in the gold-medal match at the 2018 World Men's Championships, but it was as much a learning opportunity for Anderson as his trios win with EJ Tackett and Kyle Troup.

All three were first-timers at the event, which is noteworthy and memorable on its own, but they also had the chance to share the lanes with two of the most decorated bowlers in Team USA history. Anderson hopes he can use all the things he learned there to help Team USA find success in 2021.

"Thankfully, my first trip to the World Championships came alongside two of the greatest players in our sport or country - Tommy Jones and Chris Barnes," said Anderson, the 2018 Professional Bowlers Association Player of the Year. "I was able to learn a lot from them, and I hope to use that experience to help lead the Dubai team to more success for Team USA."

As part of the new design of the event, team competition will shift from five players to four, while everything after the tournament-opening singles event will be contested using a

variation of Baker scoring.

In the traditional Baker format, each member of a five-player team bowls two frames, and the team members work together to complete a game. The leadoff bowler bowls the first and sixth frames, the next team member completes the second and seventh frames and so on.

In Dubai, the concept will be adapted for doubles, trios and the two team events, with strategy determining which players in the lineup will bowl extra frames, where applicable.

"More than anything, we're just looking forward to being back on the lanes and competing against the best bowlers from across the globe," Team USA head coach Bryan O'Keefe said. "It may take a little time to get used to the changes, but we expect the new formats and pace of competition to up the intensity and excitement for the bowlers and fans.

There also will be a lot more strategy involved in setting the lineups, and that will be a fun challenge."

In recent years at the IBF World Championships, six games of total pinfall determined the four players or teams that advanced to the semifinals in each event, where they were seeded into a bracket-style championship round. Semifinal

losers earned bronze medals, and the winners advanced to bowl for the gold and silver medals.

Prior to that, medals were awarded based on total pinfall.

Since the inception of the World Championships in the 1950s, formats have changed, and there even was a time when the team event included as many as eight bowlers, but many aspects of the event are timeless.

The pressure, pride and prestige involved in competing for your country are unparalleled. Kulick expects to feel some of the same excitement she felt in 1999 during the first of her six appearances at the World Championships.

Her debut came just over an hour away in Abu Dhabi, and she left that event with a singles gold medal, the lone gold for the United States that year. Her return to Abu Dhabi in 2015 ended with gold medals in doubles and team.

"I recall the 1999 event very vividly because we were going to be in Abu Dhabi for three weeks, it was over Thanksgiving, which is my favorite holiday, there were some big life pieces that needed to move around to make it work and it was my first opportunity as an adult representative of Team USA to experience bowling on the world stage," Kulick said. "It definitely was a highlight for me before starting my professional career, and any chance to be back in that environment is special."

Official practice for the 2021 Super World Championships will take place Thursday and Friday, with singles competition getting underway Saturday.

Singles will consist of 10 qualifying games over two days, after which the field in each gender classification will be cut to the top 32 for group match play. Each group will include eight players, and they'll all bowl seven games of round-robin match play.

Points will be awarded for each win in match play, and the top two players in each group, based on points, will advance to the bracket-style quarterfinals. The quarterfinals and semifinals will be one-game matches, and the championship match will be a best-of-two battle, with a ninth- and 10th-frame roll-off being used if a third game is needed.

Doubles, trios and team competition will be contested similarly, but utilizing a variation of the Baker format. The top 32 in doubles and top 16 for trios and both team competitions will advance to match play.

Along with Team USA's singles and trios wins at

U.S. Open Headed to Indianapolis in 2022, USBC Masters Returns to Las Vegas

ARLINGTON, Texas - The United States Bowling Congress and the Bowling Proprietors' Association of America have selected Woodland Bowl in Indianapolis as the host center for the 2022 U.S. Open and Gold Coast Hotel & Casino as the location for the USBC Masters.

The U.S. Open is scheduled for Jan. 30-Feb. 6, with invitations going out this week. Registration for the pre-tournament qualifier, an on-site event that will give those who did not earn direct entry into the tournament a chance to make the elite field, is open.

The Masters will take place March 28-April 3, and online registration will open Nov. 2.

The dates and locations are subject to change based on recommended best practices, social-distancing protocols and other COVID-19 restrictions.

Both events are considered majors on the Professional Bowlers Association Tour, will

feature a top prize of \$100,000 and will conclude live on Fox Sports' FS1/FOX as part of the 2022 PBA Tour television schedule.

All rounds of competition leading up to the TV finals will be broadcast live on BowlTV.

"We've been fortunate to visit some amazing bowling centers in recent years, and they've become a special part of the continuing history of our sport's most prestigious events," BPA Executive Director Frank DeSocio. "Woodland Bowl, the Indianapolis bowling community and all of great facilities we visit in the Las Vegas area are top-notch, and we know the experience at both events will be memorable for the bowlers and fans."

The U.S. Open again will include 108 of the world's best bowlers, most of whom earned their spots in the event based on recent on-lane performances.

The tournament will begin with a pre-tournament qualifier

Jan. 30 and conclude with a live stepladder on FS1 on Feb. 6 at 5 p.m. Eastern.

Woodland Bowl has been home to many top-tier events and PBA Tour competition, including past editions of the U.S. Open. It last was held there in 2010, won by Bill O'Neill, and was where Dave Husted became the last player to successfully defend a U.S. Open title in 1996.

The 70-lane venue was one of six Indianapolis-area centers that hosted the Junior Gold Championships in 2021, and the facility earned a place in bowling history in 2016 when Anthony Simonsen won the USBC Masters to become the sport's youngest major champion at age 19.

The list of competitors expected to compete for the coveted green jacket and iconic trophy at the 2022 U.S. Open includes the leaders on the PBA Tour points list, Team USA and Junior Team members and top performers at USBC events and PBA majors.

The U.S. Open format features qualifying across multiple oil patterns and round-robin match play, before the top five competitors advance to the TV stepladder, based on their 56-game pinfall totals.

The 2021 U.S. Open was held in Reno, Nevada, in April and won by Ohio's Chris Via for his first PBA Tour title. He defeated Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, 214-213 at the famed National Bowling Stadium.

Via's 2021 also included a pair of televised 300s in PBA Tour competition and the Regular All-Events title at the storied USBC Open Championships.

The operation of the U.S.

Open and U.S. Women's Open is a collaborative effort by USBC and BPAA and jointly funded by the two organizations.

The Masters last was held at Gold Coast Bowling Center in 2019, with Butturff winning the tournament for his first major title. The left-hander defeated fellow southpaw Mikel Holli-

man of Collierville, Tennessee, in the title match, 228-196.

The 2019 edition featured 450 competitors, who participated in 15 games of qualifying over three days, before the field was cut to the top 63, plus the defending champion, for the unique double-elimination

As we have seen in recent years, the PBA has shown great progress bringing in more casual fans to watch its television finals. That being the case, one next step might be trying something used to rejuvenate a signature event of sports television, NFL Monday Night Football.

Known as ManningCast, the companion show airing on ESPN2 at the same time as this season's ESPN Monday Night Football, is a well-executed

idea by the two recently retired Manning brothers, Peyton and Eli. It is not a new idea, but their version features live commentary by current players of other teams during the game. In recent years, higher profile college football national championship games have had similar format shows on sister channels of the game channel (lately also on ESPN) with coaches and other broadcasters sitting in a studio. Rather than from a studio at ESPN campus

in Bristol, Connecticut, players on the show talk from their homes in a Zoom or Google Meet format talking about the night's game in real time with Peyton and Eli in lively manner.

For bowlers, the closest scenario to this would be sitting in a sports bar or other larger room with other current tour players watching a PBA telecast and being near enough to hear their comments. At an ABC World Team Challenge qualifier in the mid-1990s, I had the chance to see a couple of tour players and some of the best regional and amateur players across the country with what had to be close to a hundred players watch a tour telecast.

I've written several times about an event that occurred later that day in detail, watching color analyst for that WTC final grab a pair of house shoes and a house ball and throw on the shot after the day's qualifying to confirm ball movement he had seen. The man's name was Earl Anthony.

To say the banter among those gathered was lively would be an understatement. It was like having dozens of color analysts yelling at the big screen and at each other, many who were

quite accomplished and had even bowled a few Masters and other tour stops with the bowlers we were all watching, Informative, no question. Entertaining, absolutely. Enjoyable, without a doubt.

Some of the best banter was during the October 25 MNF game with guests Sue Bird, Drew Brees, Marshawn Lynch, and some guy named Tom Brady. As you may remember, Brady lost two Super Bowls to Eli and the New York Giants and two AFC Championship Games to Peyton, one with the Colts, one with the Broncos. As you might expect, the

good-natured barbs were very entertaining to watch (you know friend-of-the-column Sandi Charles was watching).

Average viewership has been increasing from 800,000 to just shy of two million last week, although not airing the next few Monday nights. According to awfulannouncing.com, the future of the show yet to be decided.

Could the current PBA live stream service do this? Probably. One technical issue would have to be addressed since FloBowling carries the Fox Television broadcast overseas during live or first airing of PBA on Fox telecasts, a second feed would need to be established.

But with the issues FloBowling has had this year with PBA live streams, don't hold your breath.

A former FloBowling announcer is taking the next step in his career of PBA coverage by offering PBA Midwest Regional coverage. Phil Brylow, also known as \$2 Phil, according to his \$2 Phil Facebook page, started his coverage with the PBA/PBA50 Allstate Liberty Lanes Central/Midwest Open from Jerry Morano's Liberty Lanes in Carpentersville, Illinois (Chicagoland suburbs where I actually bowled for a PBA title many moons ago) on his \$2 Phil Facebook page linked in with the PBA Midwest Region Facebook page.

Through this live stream service, called Strike Central, Brylow offered multiple pair

coverage in the manner he did with FloB, featuring his commentary and with special guests

visiting the booth. Viewers could also watch through Just A Game Live Web Services at justagamelive.com, offering Brylow's main feed and coverage from four different pairs.

Could others do this? Obviously, yes. With the bowling talent in the Southwest Region and with some experienced on-air personnel, it would be great eye and ear candy.

During my sampling of Brylow's coverage last weekend, he broke the item usually reserved for PBA regional roll calls. PBA Midwest Region legend Dale Traber was presented with his champions banner after the PBA50 qualifying in Carpentersville, an act usually reserved upon a retirement from PBA competition.

The 2014 USBC Hall of Fame inductee started his PBA Regional career in 1984 (the same year I did). Dale's 52 overall regional titles, 39 PBA and 13 PBA50, are second only to

Chris Warren with 55 on the latest numbers I could find.

Now in his mid-60's, Traber's regular regional wins range from his first in 1987 to his 39th in 2012, senior wins from 2007 to 2013, he was a fixture bowling on Sundays in match play. Yes, you read that right if you did some quick math. He won his final regular regional at age 55. After turning 50, he captured three

Where Are They Now? Bud Horn Remembers Team Era Bowling

Since writing an article about "The Bowling Chain That Started Them All" in late July of 2021, I have been carrying on an email conversation with Tom Knapp, who happened to be a bowler at one of the American International Bowling Corporation (AIBC) locations, which was the topic of conversation in that article.

The next week he sent me a photo of his son enjoying the game of duckpins, which I used to supplement an article titled, "With Names Like Toots and Bookie, How Will Duckpins Ever Die?" Since that time Knapp has kept in touch and once again commented after the Donna Adamek article "Where Are They Now... Donna Adamek Fondly Remembers Western Columbia and Bobbe North."

As it turns out, Mr. Knapp had moved from Maryland to California and was employed by Western Columbia during the time catalogued in the article involving the illustrious career of Donna Adamek. When he saw the title, "Where Are They Now," Tom said that I should do an article like that about Bud Horn. He even followed up by providing me with an email address and phone number for Mr. Horn.

I called Bud earlier this week and had a delightful conversation about his bowling career. I did a bit of research before calling and decided to focus on Mr. Horn's American Bowling Congress (ABC) record (now known as the United States Bowling Congress, or USBC). At 84 years young, his memory was as sharp as a tack, particularly when remembering acquaintances that he had made throughout his bowling career.

Bud grew up in Los Angeles and bowled in Junior Leagues with longtime friend Norm Meyers at Santa Monica Bowl. In addition to his fabulous career on the ABC Championship lanes each year, Horn also collected 2 wins on the PBA Tour in 1966 (Labor Day Classic, Hart Bowl, Dallas, TX) and the Mercury Open in

1970 (Hilander Bowling Palace, Oklahoma City, OK). In PBA tournament competition from 1963 to 1970, he made the top five 19 times, including 5 times in 1966 and 6 times in 1967.

However, it was in team bowling that Bud Horn prevailed. During our conversation Mr. Horn commented with a chuckle, "I knew how to pick good teams," when asked about his team accomplishments at the ABC Championships, an event that moves to a different city almost every year. The tall and gifted athlete, who now resides in Las Vegas, won 4 "Eagles" in the ABC Championships, emblematic of a first-place finish in team, doubles, singles or all events.

All of Bud's titles came in team play. His first came as a member of the 1963 California Bombers (Fresno, CA), and included teammates Bill Maglione, Johnny King, Bill Bunetta and childhood friend Norm Meyers. His next title came in 1967, as a member of the Balancer Glove team from Ft. Worth, TX. That team was comprised of five future Hall of Fame members: Dick Ritger, Wayne Zahn, Bill Bunetta, Johnny Guenther and Horn.

"We were all sponsored (except Bunetta) on the PBA tour by Ollie Jordan, a banker from Wisconsin," said Horn, regarding the Balancer Glove team. "We later changed our name to Jordan Enterprises for a few years and placed fourth in the 1971 tournament." But it was in 1974 when Bud accepted an offer by Nelson Burton Jr. to join the powerful Munsingwear #2 team out of Minneapolis, that the pinnacle of his career was achieved.

"We missed the 1974 team championship by one pin to the Ebonite team from Hopkinsville, Kentucky," remembers Horn, "and then we won the title in 1975 and 1976. We were the only team to win the Classic Division twice, and we almost won it three years in a row." (The Classic Division began in 1961 in order to separate professional bowlers from non-professionals. It was

discontinued after the 1979 event).

The Munsingwear #2 team was also a team made up of five future Hall of Famers: Barry Asher, Roy Buckley, Norm Meyers, Nelson Burton Jr., and Horn. During all of those record setting team performances, Horn also managed to chalk up 11 consecutive all-events totals of 1800 or better from 1966 to 1976, which at the time was an ABC record. He rolled the very first 300 game in ABC Masters competition in 1961, and rolled another 300 in the Classic Singles in 1976.

Bud Horn was elected to the ABC Hall of Fame in 1992. He competed in 21 annual events, averaging 202 over that time. He was drafted into the National Bowling League (NBL) by the San Antonio Cavaliers in 1961. "We played all of our games on the road when our top investor backed out, and the stadium was never built," said Horn. "The league had 10 teams, but before the first season was complete, four of the teams had folded."

One can only imagine what might have been for Bud Horn, a preminent team player, had the NBL survived.

The Delete Button

I shouldn't say 'never' rerack a spare, but I'm not one to let the shoulds run my life, so... when you are practicing, NEVER RERACK A SPARE.

After all, it's not a delete button. Giving yourself permission, however tacit, to blow off the spare will carry over to competition. You'll throw at a real one indifferently and waste that precious double you just worked so hard to get. Spares deserve just as much attention, if not more, than all those strike efforts.

Take the shot. Maybe you throw to get lined up rather than to make the spare. That's okay. Even if you don't hit the standing pins, the subliminal message of not sweeping it off gives it credence.

Spares are what keep you in the money. I believe in some of your practice sessions, your spare ball should be the only one you take in the building.

It is certainly true that when you shoot the 6/10 with a full rack, the consequences of your failure are not great. After all, if you miss, you get another chance. However, when that 6/10 is standing there by itself, sometimes the pins look like toothpicks! The only way to get comfortable with the angle and your timing is to repeat shots until you are competent. Then they'll look like barrels instead of slivers. Shoot at them until you can't miss.....

After shooting the 6/10 with a full rack, you'll probably have

some pins standing up on the left side of the lane - a perfect chance to pick off a left side spare. When you shoot the 4/7 with a full rack, a right side

spare will most likely remain. Choose what you shoot to challenge yourself. Training sessions like this will help alleviate that sinking feeling in the pit of your stomach when you leave a difficult spare or even those single pin "clusters" that bother you.

You know how many times you've missed the cut by a spare or lost a game because of count on a split. You'll never strike enough to cover up for a missed spare!

Zavala Wins Third Title of 2021 Season at PWBA Reno Classic

RENO, Nev. – Stephanie Zavala of Downey, California, won her third title of the 2021 Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour season Tuesday at the PWBA Reno Classic.

The front-runner for PWBA Rookie of the Year defeated Bryanna Coté of Tucson, Arizona, for the title at the National Bowling Stadium, 207-194, to become the first athlete to record three victories this season.

She earned \$10,000 for the win, which was broadcast live on BowlTV.com.

The win also allowed the 25-year-old right-hander to become the first bowler since PWBA and United States Bowling Congress Hall of Famer Leanne Hulsenberg to win three titles as a rookie on a professional women's bowling tour.

Hulsenberg claimed three victories during her rookie campaign in 1987 and has won 27 career titles.

"This means the world to me," said Zavala, who also won the PWBA Greater Cleveland Open and PWBA BVL Open. "This is all I've dreamed about for so long. I'm out here proving myself day in and day out, and I deserve to be here as much as anybody."

In the title match, Zavala capitalized on a pair of cross-over strikes in the third and seventh frames to put together five consecutive strikes to take the lead.

Zavala opened in the eighth

frame after leaving a 2-4-8-10 split but bounced back with a strike in the ninth frame to maintain the opportunity to shut out Coté in the 10th.

"I had made a move (in the eighth), but it probably wasn't the right move," said Zavala, who defeated Coté in the title match to win the Greater Cleveland Open. "We were playing a little defense since I had tugged a few shots. In my mind, I was playing it safe and thinking I would get away with it if I tugged it again, but I ended up throwing it decent and the ball never recovered."

"I knew I needed to put some sort of pressure on her (in the ninth). All I could think about was to hit the pocket and pure the shot. Even if I got tapped, as long as I was in the pocket, she was going to be thinking about it."

Coté had recorded strikes in her seventh and eighth frames but was unable to keep the streak intact in the ninth, leaving a 2 pin. After converting the spare, Coté did not connect for a strike on her first delivery in the 10th, giving Zavala the chance to secure the win without a mark in her final frame.

Zavala toppled nine pins on her first shot in the 10th to hoist the Reno Classic trophy.

She entered the season-ending Fall Classic Series, which features the Reno Classic, PWBA Pepsi Classic and PWBA Tour Championship, with a 15,050-point lead in the race for PWBA Rookie of the Year over Breanna Clemmer of Clover,

South Carolina.

With her victory Tuesday, Zavala now has expanded her lead to more than 26,300 points with two events remaining in the 2021 season. Clemmer finished the Reno Classic tied for 19th place.

"I'm going to take a minute tonight and enjoy it, but once my alarm clock goes off tomorrow it's right back to business," Zavala said. "What I did yesterday and today might not happen tomorrow. There's a different game plan and mindset, and I'm going to be right back at it."

Coté had earned the top seed for Tuesday's stepladder finals on the strength of an 8-3-1 record in match play earlier in the day at the NBS. She finished match play with a 5,645 total, including bonus pins.

She was in search of her second title of the season and third career PWBA Tour title.

Zavala advanced to the title match by defeating three-time titlist Stefanie Johnson of McKinney, Texas, in the semifinals, 233-194. Zavala started the game with strikes on six of her first seven deliveries to build the early advantage and advance.

Johnson kicked off the stepladder with a win over seven-time champion Kelly Kulick of Union, New Jersey, 205-189. Johnson stayed clean and held off a late rally from Kulick, who opened in two of her first four frames.

The Reno Classic featured 12 games of qualifying on a 37-foot oil pattern Monday to determine the top 12 players for round-robin match play Tuesday. Total pinfall, including bonus pins, for 24 games determined the four finalists for the stepladder.

The 2021 PWBA Player of the Year also will be determined during the Fall Classic Series this week.

England's Verity Crawley has taken over the top spot on the season-long points list, which determines the award

winner. Crawley finished fifth at the Reno Classic and now has accumulated 113,100 points on the season.

Two-time reigning PWBA Player of the Year Shannon O'Keefe of Shiloh, Illinois, is second with 112,070 points, and Ukraine's Dasha Kovalova is third with 111,800.

Coté's runner-up finish moves her into fourth with 105,695 points, and three-time PWBA Player of the Year Liz Johnson of Niagara Falls, New York, is fifth with 103,810.

match-play competition.

The Masters bracket features three-game matches, with total pinfall determining the winner of each match. The event first was held in 1951.

After not being held in 2020 due to the pandemic, the Masters returned to action in 2021 and visited the National Bowling Stadium in conjunction with the 2021 U.S. Open.

Right-hander Thomas Larsen became the first player from Denmark to win the event. He defeated top seed Jesper Svensson of Sweden, 197-176, for the first major title of his career, which also earned him a guaranteed spot in the 64-player bracket in 2022.

Qualifying at the 2022 Masters will get underway March 29, and the new champion will hoist the trophy live on FOX on April 3 at 1 p.m. Eastern.

The total prize fund at the Masters will be based on entries, and the cash ratio will be 1:4. The U.S. Open will pay out \$260,000.

USBC and BPAA announced

in August that the four major championships they present each year - the U.S. Women's Open, U.S. Open, USBC Queens and USBC Masters - will be awarding \$100,000 to each champion through 2023.

Team USA's Josie Barnes of Hermitage, Tennessee, won the record \$100,000 first-place prize at the 2021 U.S. Women's Open in August for her first major title and fourth Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour title overall.

"There are few events in the world that offer the challenge, excitement and prestige of bowling's U.S. Open or the Masters, and we can't wait to see them unfold in these two venues that have been home to so many great moments," USBC Executive Director Chad Murphy said. "We also look forward to the added excitement of awarding \$100,000 to each winner."

competitor on the PWBA Tour since it relaunched in 2015, making 15 championship-round appearances prior to Sunday's appearance at the Tour Championship.

She had been unable to turn those opportunities into victories, however, but a new approach has helped her enjoy each moment.

At the U.S. Women's Open in August, she qualified for the stepladder and rolled 279 in her first match, before losing her ball reaction on the way to a third-place finish.

"I've had to work really hard," Pluhowsky said. "I'm just trying to have fun. It's not life or death anymore. I took it way too seriously and was trying too hard for too long. The last few times, I just tried to have fun. I lost my ball reaction at the U.S. Women's Open and didn't throw it the greatest in the second game, but here, I had a good look and tried to do what I needed to do."

Sunday's win also was special for Pluhowsky because she was able to share it with her wife, Carrie, and father, Nick.

"Things are looking up and really good," Pluhowsky said. "We got married in July, and it means a lot that she's able to travel with me. My dad flew in for the show, and he was worried he was going to jinx me. My mom was too nervous to come, so she stayed home. I wish the kids were here, but I'm glad he came and she's here. It's great."

Coté was the top seed for Sunday's stepladder after averaging more than 233 in match play Friday and Saturday, but she had trouble figuring out the left lane on the championship pair.

She noted some struggles on that lane earlier in the week during the finals of the PWBA

Reno Classic, where she also was the top seed and finished as the runner-up to Stephanie Zavala of Downey, California.

"I feel like I had the right lane down pretty well, but I'm still trying to figure out what was happening on the left lane," Coté said. "I struggled with it at the Reno Classic, too. I made some moves, but you only get five shots on each lane, and everything is a guessing game when you get lost in that position. Shannon was bowling great, and I had to try to find ways to strike."

Coté still was able to collect some hardware Sunday. Her runner-up finish secured her spot at the top of the season-long points list, and it earned her PWBA Player of the Year honors for the first time in her career.

The 35-year-old right-hander collected her second career PWBA Tour title in January at the PWBA ITRC Classic, and she added three runner-up finishes in her six championship-round appearances during the season.

She entered the events in Reno this week eighth in points but quickly entered the conversation for the postseason award with her runner-up finish Tuesday.

"I had talked to my husband about it, and coming into Reno, we never even thought player of the year was on the table," Coté said. "I knew the points were very close, especially with two regular events and a major to go, and things could shift around pretty easily. You can't count out those ahead of you, though, because they're there for a reason. All I could do was just bowl and try to bowl great. When I realized I was getting closer and put myself in position to be player of the year, I just stayed the course and tried to stay focused. If it was meant to be, it was meant to be."

Zavjalova, a two-time major winner and four-time PWBA

Tour champion, earned her spot in the semifinals with a 190-164 victory over Zavala, the 2021 PWBA Rookie of the Year.

Zavjalova took advantage of a missed single pin by Zavala in the eighth frame and rolled strikes on five of her last six shots to advance.

Zavala, a three-time winner during her rookie season, kicked off the stepladder with a 203-200 win over two-time PWBA Player of the Year Shannon O'Keefe of Shiloh, Illinois.

Zavala needed to fill 17 pins in her final frame to eliminate O'Keefe and struck on her first delivery. A nine-count on her second shot secured the victory.

O'Keefe entered the broadcast with the chance to earn the PWBA Player of the Year award for a third consecutive season, but she needed to record at least a fourth-place finish to force Coté to win the Tour Championship to earn enough competition points.

The Tour Championship was the third event of the PWBA Fall Classic Series, which also included the Reno Classic and PWBA Pepsi Classic.

After Zavala won the Reno Classic on Tuesday, Julia Bond of Aurora, Illinois, captured her third win of the year at the Pepsi Classic on Thursday.

The Tour Championship featured the top 24 athletes from the first two events of the Fall Classic Series. The combined qualifying totals from the Reno Classic and Pepsi Classic (24 games) determined the players to advance to the season-ending event.

Pinfall dropped at the beginning of the Tour Championship, which featured three eight-game blocks of round-robin match play Friday and Saturday. Total pinfall, including bonus pins for each victory, determined Sunday's five finalists.

won her first major at the 2021 United States Bowling Congress Queens, also held at the NBS. "I think we did a good job of being open-minded and flexible."

Rodriguez was making her first championship-round appearance of the 2021 season after earning the top seed for the stepladder by a single pin over Parkin. Rodriguez struck on her fill ball against Parkin in the position round earlier on Thursday to finish qualifying with a 5,646 total, including bonus pins.

Parkin made her fifth championship-round appearance of the year. She has three runner-up finishes this season, including to Bond at the USBC Queens.

Johnson made her second consecutive finals appearance at the PWBA Fall Classic Series after placing third at the PWBA Reno Classic on Tuesday. It marked her third championship-round appearance of the

season.

The Fall Classic Series features the final three events of the 2021 PWBA Tour season — the Reno Classic, Pepsi Classic and PWBA Tour Championship.

All four finalists from the Pepsi Classic qualified for the Tour Championship, and Bond is looking to use the momentum from her win to make a run at a second major and the chance to win PWBA Player of the Year for the 2021 season, which is based on position on the season-long points list.

"After this event, I know I'm throwing it well," Bond said. "It's a nice confidence boost and offers a little validation. Now, I need to make good choices and be smart. That's the goal heading into the next event."

Heading into the final event, the race for PWBA Player of the Year features six players within 8,600 points of current leader Verity Crawley of England.

Crawley (118,600 points) is 300 points ahead of Ukraine's Dasha Kovalova (118,300) and 355 points ahead of Bond

(118,245).

Two-time reigning PWBA Player of the Year Shannon O'Keefe of Shiloh, Illinois, enters the Tour Championship in fourth place with 115,770 points and is followed by Coté (111,445), Parkin (110,262.5) and three-time PWBA Player of the Year Liz Johnson of Niagara Falls, New York (110,060).

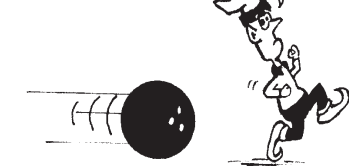

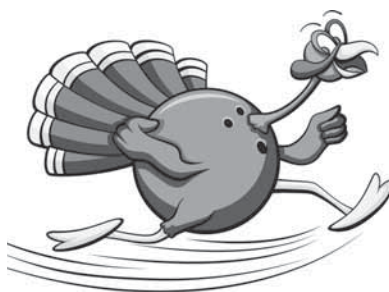
