SUZHOU, China- Sean Rash, a 14-time Professional **Bowlers Association Tour title** winner, added another unique accomplishment to his portfolio when he swept fellow American PBA member AJ Johnson in a best-of-three-game title match to win the historic PBA China Tiger Cup at Suzhou Tiger

Bowl, the first PBA event ever held in China.

Rash, from Montgomery, Illinois, defeated Johnson, from nearby Oswego, 211-194 and 227-207 for the title. Rash's conversion of the 2-4-8-10 split in the ninth frame to win game one was the pivotal shot in the

The two Illinois bowlers were part of a seven-player PBA delegation that bowled in a single-elimination match play event that also included nine PBA members from China and Chinese Hong Kong. Rash collected \$20,000 for his win; Johnson received \$10,000 as runner-up.

The finals were livestreamed Tuesday on FloBowling.com by the PBA's online streaming partner. The finals also are available in the FloBowling archive.

The tournament was an out-growth of a movement that began early in the current decade when China expressed interest in developing bowlers as PBA-level competitors.

USBC to Implement a Tiered **Center Certification Program**

ARLINGTON, Texas - Following a recent study of the lane certification process and analyzing data from lane inspections, the United States **Bowling Congress determined it** will implement a center certification program, featuring tiered levels of certification and a national staff of lane inspectors, over the next five years.

Details of the tiered center certification program will be announced at the 2021 USBC Convention. The USBC **Equipment and Specifications** Committee, which made the decision to implement the program, has delegated authority from the USBC Board to make changes to equipment specifications.

BVL Month in America Brings Awareness to the Bowling Community's Commitment to Veterans

FAIRFAX, Va. - The focus of the bowling community turns to veterans in November with BVL Month in America, an initiative that brings awareness to the work that BVL (Bowlers to Veterans Link) does to support veterans and active duty military by funding recreation and therapy services throughout the United States.

As bowling's oldest and own charity, the bowling community is active in raising funds and awareness to support America's veterans since 1942. While many centers and bowling associations started their fundraising events around Veterans Day, BVL Executive Director Mary Harrar emphasizes that November is only the beginning of the ongoing year-round fundraising efforts including programs such as "Shoes For Freedom" which asks bowling centers to set aside at least one shoe rental daily for a month, quarter or year as a donation to BVL.

Over the next year, Harrar said the focus will be on the organization's "I AM BVL" campaign, calling it a simple message to share with others about why they support BVL and its work with veterans. "Almost everyone has a personal connection to military service or a veteran, whether it's a family member or friend, and \boldsymbol{I} AM BVL helps tell the stories of the impact that veterans make on all of us."

Harrar joined the BVL Board of Directors in Washington, D.C., for several activities on Veterans Day, including a BVL fundraising event, the annual **BVL Board of Directors meeting** chaired by John LaSpina of Long Beach, N.Y., and participation in a wreath-laying ceremony. The BVL flag was also included in the parade of colors which kicked off the national day of observance.



"It's a tremendously emotional, almost indescribable. experience to present the wreath to the honor guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier on behalf of BVL." said LaSpina, who was one of four BVL representatives to participate in a wreath-laying ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery on Veterans Day. "It puts into perspective the undeniable sacrifices that our veterans make for all of us, and amplifies the importance of the work BVL does to provide needed support and services for all who have served."

LaSpina noted that the bowling community has been a stalwart supporter of BVL and veterans over the past 77 years since BVL was founded, adding "there is still so much more we

can all do to raise our voices and much-needed funds to brighten veterans' lives.'

BVL Board member and USBC Vice President Karen Jost of Turnwater, Wash., and bowling proprietor David Kellerman of Georgetown, Texas, also represented BVL at the Veterans Day Breakfast with U.S. Secretary of Veterans Affairs Robert Wilkie. Kellerman, who recently completed a 2,192mile, five-month hike through the Appalachian Trail to raise more than \$80,000 for BVL and veterans, was also part of the BVL contingent participating in the wreath-laying ceremony.

The weekend in the nation's capital kicked off with a fundraiser hosted by Bill





inspection of the nearly 4,000 centers. It required evaluating staff needed and the tools required. During the evaluation, the focus turned to the time required for an inspection.

The USBC Equipment Specifications and Certifications team is examining the tools to streamline the inspection process. Additional testing of the tools will continue.

USBC also plans to hire and train a small team of national inspectors, who will coordinate with centers to efficiently conduct lane inspections throughout the country.

In recent years, USBC set out to improve the center certification process, studying the process over a three-year period and publishing its study of 64 centers and more than 1,000 lanes across 20 states. The

results led to changes in the center certification process that were announced at the 2017 USBC Convention.

Data collection and analysis, including spot-checks to determine the accuracy of the data collected, confirmed a new approach to center certification was needed.

The USBC Equipment Specifications team, in coordination with the committee and a third-party consultant, then spent the next 12 months working on a tiered center certification model. It enlisted several focus groups of industry stakeholders to evaluate and build the model.

Additional education and awareness, including an ongoing dialogue with all stakeholders, will be important as the process moves forward.





Sam Houston State wins 2019 **Hawk Classic Invitational**

Wire-to-wire victories are rare, but don't tell that to Sam Houston State, who claimed the title at the 2019 Hawk Classic Invitational.

The Bearkats bested Arkansas State in the title match, 4-2, in the best-of-seven championship round to cap off an event in which they led after each round of competition at Millsboro Lanes in Millsboro, Delaware.

A total of 18 teams competed in the 2019 edition, which included 15 of the top 25 teams, and six of the 10 teams according to the National Tenpin **Coaches Association preseason**

Both teams traded wins during the first two games of the title tilt before the Bearkats took Games 3 and 4 to take a 3-1 lead. The Red Wolves responded by winning Game 5, bringing the match to 3-2.

In Game 6, Arkansas State started play slowly with open frames in two of the first three frames, while Sam Houston State struck on four of their first five shots. The Red Wolves found some rhythm in the fourth frame which started a streak of five consecutive strikes, which ended with a spare in the ninth frame.

Sam Houston traded spares and strikes from frames six through nine, which setup the possibility of a tie if both teams struck out in the final frame.

Sophomore Bea Hernandez of Sam Houston State stepped up first in the 10th frame and tossed a strike, while Arkansas State senior Julia Huren countered with a strike of her own. Both players again would strike to setup the pivotal 12th shot.

Hernandez left a 4 pin on her final shot, which gave Huren the chance to strike to extend the match, but she left a Greek Church on her fill ball allowing Sam Houston State to secure the victory.

To advance to the title match, Sam Houston State defeated Sacred Heart, 4-3, while Arkansas State defeated Sam Houston State, 4-2, in Round 1 to clinch a berth in the title match. The Red Wolves swept Kutztown in Round 2.

In the battle for third place, **Duquesne and Sacred Heart** battled in a seven game thriller but it was Duquesne who came away with the victory, 4-3.

In the individual standings, Sacred Heart's Caitlyn Kelly took home the top spot with a five-game total of 1,101, an average of 220.2. She was followed by Monmouth's Saige Yamada (1,100), Sam Houston State's Lynne Fishler (1,098), Arkansas State's Huren (1,089) and Tulane's Isabelle Lee (not pictured; 1,064). Fishler was named the tournament's most valuable player.

All 18 teams in the field bowled five five-game Baker matches Friday and five traditional team games Saturday before being seeded into the best-of-seven match-play bracket based on total pinfall. The top four teams all entered the day with a chance to win the tournament.

Along with the Hawk Classic Invitational trophy, each match the teams bowled counted toward their overall win-loss record, which helps determine the teams that qualify for the 2020 National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) **Bowling Championship being** held in Detroit from April 9-11.





I've done several 'Lost Classics' on long time PBA player Charlie Tapp, who posted the video of his third of three tour wins on his Facebook page, the 1989 PBA Toyota Classic. on the 30th anniversary of that win two weeks ago, seen here (https://www.youtube.com/ watch?v= zrJGz-3ut1E).

Earlier this summer, Tapp made a strong bid to become the oldest player to win on the PBA50 Tour this past summer at age 68 by a third-place finish at David Small's Jax 60 Classic presented by Track.

His wife of over 30 years, former LPBT player Marliss Tapp, is head coach of the Aquinas women's bowling team. Tapp, a part time sales rep for bowling distributor DiLaura Brothers is head coach of the Aquinas University men's bowling team.

One of the more colorful personalities on either PBA or PBA50 Tours and never shy (especially for a certain charming and delightful bowling columnist), Tapp had his career year in 1989 making two finals telecasts, winning both tournaments. The first, the Greater Hartford Open, requalified him for the Firestone Tournament of Champions, taking place the following week. There had been enough first time PBA tourney winners since that 1983 win and he since hadn't won again, his eligibility ran out, according to the guidelines at the time.

Starting as the fifth seed against some pretty solid talent, Tapp ran the stepladder, taking out Dave Arnold, Jess Stayrook, and Hall of Famers Dave Husted and Steve Cook.

According to the PBA archived press release, Tapp said he carried "lucky" strikes in the first, second, sixth, and eighth frames. That eighth

frame strike was the first of a closing five bagger making Cook get the first strike in the tenth. Cook stoned a 7-pin on that shot, eventually losing 239 to 234. Tapp was stopping in Fairlawn, Ohio at Riviera Lanes for a week before heading home to Kalamazoo, Michigan.

It's a shame that show has disappeared from YouTube, because from what I remember, there were more than a few Brooklyn strikes and headpin (often called snowplow strikes if you live where snow falls November to April), making the crowd at Bradley Bowl in Hartford, Connecticut howl with bewilderment, and commentators Chris Schenkel and Bo Burton, nearly chuckle in disbelieve.

In an online chat, Tapp spoke about both 1989 wins and a fateful practice session with an action bowling legend after a 10th place finish the week before the Hartford win in April.

JPA: In the show open, color analyst Earl Anthony mentioned how beat up the lane surface was then at Tropicana Lanes. What did you see?

Tapp: Yeah, the panels were a mess. If the ball even hit 10 (board downlane) it slid in the gutter, they were dead slick outside. I hit it once, last frame of the last game qualifying, left the 1-5-7 and made it, lol, I never threw a ball in the place until qualifying started. I was in Vegas with Marliss and didn't get in town until 3:00

JPA: 1989 was a pretty good year for you, two titles and a kiss from Marliss after the second title at the end of the

show. Ever meet the mystery sponsor?

Tapp: After the '89 Firestone we had dinner at his house. Great guy. Jane Beamish, Parker's (Bohn III) mother in law, found him for me. He backed me for about a year.

JPA: How much was '89 a confidence booster for the rest of your tour career?

Tapp: The money makes your swing a lot looser that's for sure, but I still knew it was going to take a lot of work to stay up there. Resin came out a year or two later and that was altogether different, so things changed a lot in a short period of time. I never did get used to pins flying around and my ball

hooking.

JPA: Would your comment to me in my first interview with you in 1984 still apply as well, that how well one does can depend on who is doing the lanes?

Tapp: It's not quite that simple anymore. The new technology allows you to figure things out to be competitive in most environments, with exceptions of course. You can be at the mercy of a pattern designer or a creative lane machine operator, especially when you get old with a 350 rev rate.

JPA: Are you still proud of what you accomplished on the kids tour?

Tapp: Absolutely. The tour was at its peak and very difficult when there was any of a hundred guys capable of winning each week.

JPA: What other factors helped 1989 be your benchmark year on tour?

Tapp: Having the sponsor, Marliss' 100% support and I knew I was bowling well, I just needed something good to happen to give me some confidence. The week before Hartford I finished 10th in Baltimore. On the following Monday night in Hartford, Marliss, Ernie Schlegel and myself practiced. He showed me a couple of different ways to play lanes when they got crappy and nothing else worked. I used them during qualifying and put together a great run to make the finals and ended up making the show and winning. He called me at the bowling center the second the show ended, it was a quite a conversation. Ernie rambled on about how great it was using many expletives. He may have been happier than I was.

I Don't Need a Spare Ball

Hmm. While very likely that most of the folks on the Pro Tour don't need a spare ball, most of them use one. Sometimes it's because they are on a manufacturer's staff and they are paid to do so and sometimes it's because they want to. Norm Duke doesn't use a plastic spare ball because he either flattens the shot out or, in other cases, backs it up a bit to make sure he doesn't chop the spare. As in most cases, Norm is the exception rather than the rule.

We Muggles, however, don't play like the pros. We don't shoot on their patterns or surfaces and, even if we did. we don't break them down like

they do.

I don't think in today's game that the 10 pin is the hardest spare for a righty. I think it's the stuff on the left side. Although it's true that at your home house you might figure out a way to throw your strike ball at the bucket and make it most of the time, in the real world that doesn't work very often.

Going right-to-left across the lane is way iffy, particularly on a sport shot. In addition, if you are in a tournament in an unfamiliar house even on the house shot, you just can't know what's going to happen crossing that many boards and you don't have time to discover it all.

Using a ball that doesn't respond to the lane condition (sort of like we wish our strike ball would occasionally ignore it) is the only way to be sure there are no surprises. Yes, it's true. Throwing plastic at spares will require you to be more accurate. Not a bad idea.

A plastic ball will go where you throw it. Period. (All bets are off on extremes). A plastic ball ignores the nuances and spottiness of most patterns. Good. We only want it to hit the pin hard enough to knock it over. We're not interested in power or finesse, just accuracy.

Your spare ball is the one that goes on the plane with you. It's the ball you throw the most, the one that gets you the paycheck, particularly on tough shots. Considering that it is the most inexpensive ball you can buy, go get it in your favorite color and make your way to bank.



PBA REGIONAL UP-DATE: 25 YEARS LATER, JOE FIRPO WINS AGAIN

A quarter of a century later, Joe Firpo of Tucker, Ga., defeated Gary Shultis of Levittown, N.Y., 258-214, to win a PBA Regional tournament when he won the PBA50 Gastonia Southern Open presented by Brunswick at George Pappas Liberty Lanes in Gastonia, N.C., Sunday.

Firpo, a 54-year-old former PBA member, won \$2,000 in his first PBA Regional win since a tournament in Tallahassee, Fla., in 1994. But because he dropped his PBA membership 15 years ago, he doesn't get credit for a fourth PBA title. Firpo won his only PBA Tour title with partner Del Warren in winning the 1987 Showboat PBA Doubles Classic in Las Vegas,

In the semifinal round Firpo easily disposed of Ken Shealy of Myrtle Beach, S.C., 227-190, while Shultis made it to the championship match for a third consecutive year by defeating Bill Vannoy of Lexington, S.C., 275-248. Shultis, who had won at Liberty Lanes three times in the past, pocketed 1,000 as the runner-up.

• Tom Hess of Granger, Iowa defeated Dakota Vostry of Chicago, 225-193, to win the PBA Plaza Bowl Midwest Open presented by Roto Grip in Clinton, Iowa, Sunday for his 11th PBA Regional title and the \$2,000 first prize.

In the first match of the three-player stepladder finals, Vostry defeated Kenny Calkins III of Des Moines, Iowa, 222-215, to advance to the title match to face Hess, the top qualifier. The tournament was the final PBA Midwest Region event of the 2019 season.

• Brendon Miller of Urban, Ohio defeated Michael Adams of Fresno, Mich., 208-166, to win the PBA La-Z-Boy Central Challenge at Monroe Sport Center in Monroe, Mich., Saturday for a \$1,500 first prize and his first PBA title.


