## Mike Bailey Wins PBA50 Beaumont Southwest Open

Beaumont, Texas –At the third annual PBA50 Beaumont Southwest Open, Mike Bailey from Carrollton, Texas, grabbed an early lead in the eight game qualifying round, maintained the lead after the Sunday morning Cashers Round and held on to the lead throughout the match play finals to win his second PBA50 Southwest Region title, and his ninth overall regional win. Bailey finished the event 58 pins ahead of Lee Lorts, from Katy, Texas, 4,671 pinfall to 4,613.

Bailey earned \$2,500 with the victory as Lorts collected \$1,500 for second place. Rick Lawrence, of Waxahachie, Texas, finished third for \$1,150.

The PBA Southwest Region continues an active December with the PBA Grand Casino/ Hotel/Resort Southwest Invitational for 32 players who earned their way into the pres-

tigious event. The final event in 2021 will be the PBA/PBA50 Houston Southwest Doubles presented by Mike Austin's Bowling Dynamix at Emerald Bowl in Houston, December 17-19. The winning team there will earn \$7,000.

## Does Anybody Really Know When No-Tap Bowling Started?

A couple of bowling publishers recently asked me if I might have any information on the origins of no-tap bowling, a unique form of kegling that rewards a strike when a nine count is rolled on the first shot of any frame. I had never really given it much thought, because for me, no-tap bowling was always there.

In fact, my very first trophy was in a Christmas No-Tap Doubles Tournament with partner Monte Schulz, the eldest son of Charles M. Schulz, the creator of the Peanuts comic strip. The year was 1961, and

L & L Lanes in Sebastopol had just opened. It was operated by a couple of loggers, Louie and Lonnie Headrick, who had decided that bowling might be an easier way to make a living.

While I was researching online to try and find information about the origins of no-tap bowling, the lyrics to a famous 1960's song by the pop rock group Chicago kept "popping" up in the search results, and provided some interesting correlations:

Does anybody really know (what no-tap bowling is) Does anybody really care

(when no-tap bowling started)
If so, I can't imagine why
(because it's so much fun)

We've all got time enough to (try no-tap bowling)

As a youth I remember when the California Bowling News would arrive at L & L Lanes on Friday afternoon. It was filled with all kinds of tournament activity, including many no-tap events. In my estimation, it would be safe to say that if no-tap bowling did not originate in Southern California, it certainly became an art form in Tinseltown, with the most imaginative and creative forms of tournaments and leagues.

I once again called upon my new friend Bud Horn, who grew up in Los Angeles, and at the age of 84 is probably the best source to ask when no-tap bowling started. "I remember bowling in no-tap tournaments while still in grade school," said Horn. "That would have been in 1949 or 1950 at the Rancho Bowl, an eleven-lane bowling center on Pico Boulevard in West Los Angeles."

My personal memories of no-tap tournaments piqued when I discovered the Hot Pot No-Tap, a fabulous tournament run by bowling promoter Nick Mancini at the 60-lane Grand Central Bowl in Glendale, a suburb of Los Angeles. I have written about my experiences at Grand Central many times. It was the perfect way to spend a Saturday evening whenever my duties while working for AMF would allow.

Everything about Grand Central Bowl was fun, from the difficult lane conditions (that made the no-tap format enjoyable), to the "easy money" that could be had by a No-Tap 300 Insurance option. For an additional \$5, each competitor was guaranteed a \$100 payoff for every no-tap 300 game rolled during the five-game event.

A special article that I wrote for the California Bowling News in 2017 summed it all up nicely:

online videos, helping get other pros online facetime to see anytime on demand.

As Martin begins her collegiate career this fall, she will join current NCAA athletes as the first generation to take advantage of the recently enacted NIL legislation passed July 1, 2021. That allows athletes to be compensated for their name, image, and likeness (the first letters of those three words) in individual endorsement deals inside and outside of bowling. What's unclear at this point is if Martin and others can compete under NIL for PBA and/or PWBA prize monies, even if those funds are used in a SMART program. According to NCAA and many university guidelines based on individual state guidelines, monies based on performance are not covered under NIL at the moment, but endorsement and other nonperformance related income is allowed.

To put in perspective how unique a case Martin is, she became the youngest winner on the PWBA Tour earlier this year at age 17 years, seven days. Pete Weber made his first PBA television finals at age 17, seven months, winning his first PBA title at age 19. Norm Duke is still the PBA's youngest winner at age 18 and 345 days when he won the 1983 PBA

Cleveland Open. And of course, Anthony Simonson snagged the 2016 USBC Masters five weeks after turning 19 years old. But none of those three bowled collegiately.

Whether Martin is allowed or not to accept prize monies in any form as a NCAA collegiate bowler in the future is unclear now, but I can certainly see her being a face of Generation Alpha bowlers and beyond. I've got a few pending questions for those in the know on the new NIL structure, so when I get clarification on this point, I'll pass that along.

Many athletes are using social media to do what used to be referred to as "getting your name out there," meaning getting it familiar with those within a given common interest group. One series of YouTube videos show a golfer using clubs and balls from different eras versus current equipment, comparing the technology and results of both. (If you get a chance, those are informative.)

Packy Hanrahan has started a group of videos in The House **Bowling channel. One video** had him locate a 1935 Brunswick Mineralite ball which he plugged, redrilled, and used on a house shot.

Seen here (https:// www.youtube.com/ watch?v = JXIBqIFIeoY&t = 380s), Hanrahan makes the

Mineralite look pretty good on a house shot and describes

what ball reaction he is seeing. On a side note, there was a brief shot of the ball on the press getting redrilled. As any other pro shop tech can tell you, there is nothing quite like the unmistakable scent of a ball of that era getting drilled or resurfaced (it's not a thrilling as the scent of peeling rubber spinning donuts in a parking lot, believe me).

Packy visited with former touring pro and U.S Open champ Justin Hromek and later in the video compares the Mineralite to his plastic spare and urethane balls. For players who grew up in the reactive era, it is curious to see the wonderment of what these balls do and don't do. Like other highly skilled players, once he gets lines up, he strikes for awhile.

I would like to see Hanrahan bowl on a wood lane with older patterns, perhaps something in a 28 to 32 foot length common in the late 70s or 26 foot length short oil pattern

realized that the Hot Pot side pots were really what this tournament was all about for a scratch bowler. The culmination of my understanding was one eventful night when I rolled four consecutive no-tap 300's, and in the fifth game I had the first eleven 'real' strikes before leaving the 6-10 on my last roll.

Within another couple of weeks a lot of local pro's, having read about the 300's, began to show up for the event. Mancini used this as an opportunity to run multiple squads and entries. Top notch players of the day including Fred Conner, Butch Soper, Jack Andolina, Hobo Booth and Phil Kapsimallis, to name a few, would join me in what began to

The McKendree women and St. Ambrose men each collected their first Tier I victory of the 2021-2022 United States Bowling Congress Collegiate season last weekend at the National **Collegiate Team Match Games** in Fairview Heights, Illinois.

The event was held at St. Clair Bowl and included six traditional games and 20 Baker games, with total pinfall determining the champion in each division. The tournament featured 13 women's varsity teams and 16 men's varsity programs.

In the women's division, McKendree began to find its rhythm during the final four traditional games Saturday, averaging more than 208 as a team to hold a 50-pin lead over St. Ambrose heading into Baker competition.

McKendree continued strong during the Baker block Sunday, averaging more than 216 as a team to roll to a 391-pin victory with a 10,366 total.

Mount Mercy moved into second place with 9,975, and Newman finished third with

A pair of student-athletes from St. Ambrose earned top individual honors based on their six-game totals Saturday. Addy Nelson took home the top spot with a 1,309 total (218.16 average), and Megan Hess recorded her third top-five finish of the season with 1,277.

McKendree's Rhian Dobinson (1,276) and Hope Gramly (1,265) finished third and fourth, respectively, while Davenport's Kasey Eaton took fifth with 1.259.

On the men's side, Lawrence Tech and McKendree topped the standings after the first day in Fairview Heights, with St. Ambrose sitting 121 pins out of first in third place.

The Fighting Bees battled back during the Baker block to take the lead and secured the win by 24 pins over Lawrence Tech with a 10,481 total. Lawrence Tech finished with 10,457,



The Falcon Classic was held in Toledo, Ohio, and featured 23 men's varsity teams and 20 women's varsity programs. The format included five traditional games and 12 Baker games, with total pinfall determining the champion in each division.

In the men's division at the Falcon Classic, Indiana Tech built nearly a 200-pin lead over the field during the traditional block. The Warriors averaged nearly 225 as a team during the five-game set, including a 1,264 effort in Game 4.

Concordia challenged Indiana Tech for the top spot moving into the Baker games, averaging more than 215 for the 12-game block. Heading into the final game, Indiana Tech held a seven-pin advantage over Concordia and rolled 236 to hang on for the victory with an 8,035 total.

Concordia finished second with 8,015, and Adrian was third with 7,690.

The top two spots in the men's individual standings

went to student-athletes from Indiana Tech. After starting his five-game block with 209 and 193, James Bennett finished with games of 240, 295 and 266 to take top honors with a 1,203 total, a 240.6 average. Marcus McClain claimed second place with a 1.190 total.

Cornerstone's Jonathan Ryan finished third with 1,148, while Adrian teammates Joshua Felcoski (1,134) and Cameron Klein (1,125) rounded out the top five.







Liquori would go on to host America's toughest bowling tournament, the Petersen Classic, at AMF Hoffman Lanes in nearby Hoffman Estates, Ill., from 1994 until 2014, when the center closed. (The Petersen Classic continues to this day, and is currently being held at Bowlero Wauwatosa in Wisconsin).
