on April 3rd?
What if you start off the year and you're not performing well, or you don't match up well in a certain center...too bad...that's pretty much all you get.

The season is over, and you go back home to wait eight months until you get a chance to try it again, and bowling on the PBA tour is its own animal you can't "practice" for it...you can prepare sure, but you can't get in reps on what they bowl on with the transition they see anywhere on earth. The only reps you can get are the last half of every block and if you go check the money winners list for the 2022 season, you will see the same 8-10 guys at the top of the list.

Only eight players made over \$70,000 this year, and it's pretty much the same from the year before, and the year before that. They have it all figured out and execute with precision.

How can the next level, and the level below that expect to move up if they never get more than 10-15 tournaments to learn and grow...they can't, and that needs to be addressed by the PBA leadership.

in February. Duke collected $\$ 50,000$ for the runner-up finish.

The championship round of the 2022 USBC M asters was broadcast live on FOX.

Simonsen's first win at the M asters came in 2016 and helped him become the youngest bowler in history to win a major at 19 years and 39 days old.

His wins at the 2019 PBA Players Championship and 2022 U.S. Open al so set the mark for youngest to win two and three majors, respectively, and he added another record Sunday as the youngest to four at 25 years and 87 days old.

He's now just one of nine players to win the Masters twice, and the victory marked his 10th PBA Tour title. He's also the first player to win both the M asters and U.S. Open during the same season since USBC and PBA Hall of Famer

Mike Aulby accomplished the feat in 1989.
"It's one of those things where I just like going out and bowling," Simonsen said. "I didn't have any expectations for the career. It was just something I wanted to do for a long time, because I grew up watching them. It's kind of wild how quickly it all has happened. Someone mentioned that it was six years ago when I won this event, and it doesn't seem like it's been that long.

Duke spared a 10 pin and toppled nine pins on his fill ball in the 10th frame, giving Simonsen the opportunity to win if he was able to strike on his first delivery. He made the right adjustment after leaving a 4 pin on the right lane in the
eighth frame and rolled the strike he needed. He secured the title with eight pins on his next shot.
"I made a pretty good shot on the right lane and left a 4 pin," Simonsen said. "I was a little hesitant, because there were a couple lanes throughout the week that would get through the spot but wouldn't come off it very well when you

W oessner recorded the win with an exciting 238-223 victory over USBC Hall of Famer Lucy Sandelin of Tampa, Florida, to collect the tiara awarded to the champion and $\$ 8,000$ top prize. Sandel in earned $\$ 6,000$ for the runnerup finish.

All rounds of competition from the Gold Coast Bowling Center were broadcast live at BowITV.com.

As the only undefeated player from the tournament's double-elimination bracket, Woessner earned the top seed for the stepladder and would've had to lose twice in the finals to be denied the title.

The back-and-forth championship match included four strikes in the first five frames for both competitors, but Sandelin benefited from crossover strikes in the second and fourth frames on the right lane.

The three-time USBC Senior Queens champion made the adjustment to get to the pocket in the sixth frame, but she left a 5-7 split she was unable to convert, giving the advantage to Woessner.

Sandelin bounced back with three consecutive strikes after the split, but Woessner stepped up in the ninth frame with the chance to lock her out after rolling six strikes in her first

CBS aired the pilot episode of the Tom Smallwood-inspired sitcom "How We Roll" last week. Live + 3 Nielsen ratings from showbuzzdaily. com showed it was seen by an average of 4.219 million viewers. The strength of those numbers was helped by the lead in sitcom, "Ghosts," one of

drama, "Grey's A natomy" and easily beating the second half of NBC's "Law and Order: SVU," and Fox's "Welcome to Flatch."

Fans attending the recent PBA World Series of Bowling in suburban Milwaukee were the first to see the pilot episode several weeks ago in a special screening.

Fellow Motiv and Turbo Grips staffer Smallwood told me via text, all eleven shows ordered by CBS for this season have been recorded.

And now, we wait. Ratings in the next four weeks are the critical point for next season's renewal. There will likely be some drop in the numbers as viewers decide whether to add the show to their weekly watch as well as DVR list. A gradual drop in average viewership is the norm, but a sudden drop week to week for the next month may end the show's run well before all eleven shows air. \#\#\#\#\#\#

When I read about the latest 900 series, my first thought was, great that's two this season. Then I saw it was bowled in the same tow $n$ that gave us the one and only former Dallas Cowboy and NFL legend Mike

Ditka. Stephen Kosela rolled this season's second USBC sanctioned 900 series in the Beaver Valley USBC Association tournament at Sheffield Lanes in Aliquippa, Pennsylvania, less than an hour upstream from Pittsburgh and minutes from my original junior league home center in Rochester, Pa

Typical of many of us yinzers (natives of western Pa.), we don't feel the need to tell everyone about it, even if you roll a 900 series.
"There's been a lot of talent around here for years, around eastern Ohio and here (western Pennsylvania). Crazy to think I'm the first one around here to be the first," Kosela told me last week.

The 42-year-old USPS mail carrier rolled the 36-bagger in the singles event. The part of what
left him stunned was he shot only 650 in singles on Lanes 9-10 before moving to Lanes 11-12, not know $n$ for being a high scoring pair, for doubles, the fourth group that day on the pair without a re-oil.
"I decided to keep throwing the Roto Grip Helios but moved left of the others on the pair and left of the group who bowled there earlier. Thought the look would be a little better in there, especially starting cold with no practice shots," Kosela added

Searching for a little better look. One of the most heard clichés in elite bowling these days, yet absolutely and simply stated.
"I kept that look by making
little 1-1 and 1-2 moves all series. The thought of a third 300 didn't occur to me until early in the third game. Feeling a little hungry, I ordered something to eat after game two knowing there wasn't going to be enough time between singles and the next team shift to sit down. After the second strike of the third game and then again after the fourth frame, they told me the food
was ready. I told them I'd better hold off until afterward."

After it was announced Kosela rolled the second 300, fellow tourney bowlers began to watch his third game, noticing the string of strikes continued.
"By the fifth frame, it got very quiet every time I stepped on the approach. I just went with it."

As posted by BV USBC on its Facebook live feed, the first strike in the tenth was a little high with the 9 -pin the last to fall, the eleventh strike was flush, but something was up before the twelfth shot. Watching the video was more like Hollywood movie, a serious moment of suspense. Roughly 150 people inside the 20-lane center, seconds away from watching something they would remember the rest of their lives, all eerily silent and waiting.
"As I stood on the approach, something didn't feel right, something felt off, so I backed off and started over. I was not about to shoot 898 or 899. It was going to be either an 800 series or a 900 series."

Shuffling his feet slightly,

## March Bowling Madness Revives Style From The Past

Is it just me, or did anyone else notice the number of straighter line track bowlers using urethane products during Fox Sports "March Bowling Madness" World Series of Bowling? Every night during the primetime Fox telecasts, names like Jason Sterner and Kyle Sherman were making the show, while some of the bigger name players were missing in action.

The lack of bowlers playing the track area on the lanes has been a pet peeve of mine since the introduction of the blue oil on the lanes outlining the application area. The only bowlers that have consistently used this visible advantage in recent years have been Norm Duke and Walter Ray Williams. It was refreshing during the week to see Sterner, Sherman and others, taking note of the oil line and playing a straighter direction to the pocket.

I posed these questions to Hall of Fame member Bill Spigner to get his take on the use of the blue oil defined patterns, and the recognition of the different oil patterns by a new crop of pros making the telecasts:
"Good observations, Dave," said Mr. Spigner, a three-time PBA champion on the national tour. "It's actually been happening for a while now since the bowlers started to use urethane to control the ball reaction on the lane front to back, and side to side, to allow them to go a lot straighter. This enables them to play the blend better, particularly on fresh oil."

Spigner goes on: "W hen reactive resin balls first came out they hooked considerably more than urethane and they were much more responsive to the oil and dry parts of the Iane. It forced players to play deeper angles for a couple of reasons:

1. The younger guys all developed stronger releases.
2. The dry back ends forced the players to open up their angles because of the strong reaction from the reactive resin forcing them to move away from the area of the lane that provided the most area."

How does this differ from what Norm Duke and Walter Ray Williams were doing, I
asked the winner of 9 Regional PBA Titles? "So, guys like Norm and Walter Ray were able to play that part of the pattern in the front half of the lane going straight, whereas the younger guys learned how to play the back end with a lot of hook. I was very surprised when I saw how the players lined up for the animal patterns when they were first developed, because virtually none of the qualifiers were playing the patterns relative to the oil pattern, with the possible exception of Cheetah."
"Now, the majority of the players start on top of the blend in the heads and mid-lane to keep their angles straighter and controllable. By playing the front-end of the lane a bit further to the right with a urethane ball, they are able to create some area, but it's in the first half of the lane. Walter Ray did that for years and couldn't be touched on fresh conditions, and he survived when the pattern transitioned to more inside out angles. The majority of the field couldn't keep up with him on fresh when straighter angles were required.

Many in the bowling community agree with Bill's assessment. There used to be an expression on the tour about the risk and reward of the big hook, followed by the phrase 'straighter is greater.' In reality it's not straight, but more of a down and in delivery with less hook. Spigner agrees with this evaluation:
"Now that everyone can play straighter angles, it's harder for players like Norm and Walter Ray to compete because the younger guy's speed and rev rates are much higher, giving them more strike potential. The two big reasons that the old school urethanes are back are as follows:

1. The old-style urethane balls have weaker cores which produce less track flare.
2. The cover of the older urethanes pick up a lot of oil, so when the ball gets to the back end you have more oil on a narrow track, causing a tamer reaction.

Conversely, the reactive resin balls soak the oil into the ball and the core produces a lot of flair. When the ball gets

to the back end you have a virtually dry track on the ball contacting a dry surface on the lane.

Spigner says that it's like a ball sliding on ice (oil), and then it hits the dry area (pavement), causing the ball to react violently to the abrupt change. However, the oil on the track of the old style urethanes creates oil carry down which tightens up the lane. "Today it's referred to as stretching out, or getting longer," says Bill.
"The blue oil is a little deceiving," continues Spigner. "It gives the impression by looking at it that the lanes are being blocked, when usually it's a 2 to 1 blend. House shots, by contrast, could have a wider differentiation.

Th̄anks again $\overline{\mathrm{B}} \overline{\mathrm{I}} \overline{\mathrm{l}}$, for your thorough explanation of what's happening with the lanes, as well as the difference between the reactive resin balls and the comeback of the urethane balls. Bill leaves us with one final thought to ponder.
"W hatever the playing environment is, it's our job as bowlers to learn to play on it - complaining about it only restricts our learning."



Single pin spare misses Aren't memories/ perceptions interesting? I was at a Regional tournament and saw a bowler miss a 7 pin and leave the 6/ 8 in the same game. In the re-telling of the almost-cashed-barely-missed-the-cut story, he said he would have made the cut if it hadn't been for that split. Truth is the split wouldn't have mattered if he had made the single pin spare..

I've had people tell me they will learn to spare after they learn to strike. In the meantime, they are flagging spares and leaving big wads of things to shoot, wondering when they'll get to the "next level."

We have all gone through periods where we can't miss a 10 pin and periods where it is as though we've never shot one before in our lives. You really can't have a mindset like that and become an elite player or even the best player at Shoe Up Lanes. You have to practice and shoot at every spare until you can't miss. I mean it. You do it until you cannot miss. Be honest about what you left, why you left it, and your devotion to converting it.

I use a spreadsheet to evaluate and help grow a get-everypin mentality. I chart spare conversions as well as count on splits and the program com-

putes the conversion percentage for the four major spare groups. If your center uses the free Lane Talk program, you have access to that information and a whole lot more. Lane Talk is truth journaling...

I developed my spreadsheet after I asked someone how often out of ten opportunities she made the $3 / 10$. She said about $85 \%$ of the time. So, we charted it. She was blow n away that it was less than $60 \%$ of the time. That's not uncommon, actually Conversion percentages are frequently overestimated.

Occasionally a client will complain they miss spares. Left or right side I ask. Both, they say. This is absolutely a lack of awareness. If it were really both, their average would plummet and their frustration skyrocket.

Charting will show the truth is more like making the 4/7 combination but struggling with combinations of the 2 pin, for example. Or making the 6 or the 10 , but chopping the $6 / 10$ combination. Charting all your spares will allow you to find out what your tendencies are on this condition or in that house.

That's a bonus to discovering your conversion rate or getting count. It's always better to have clear, indisputable facts so that you can plot a course of action with your coach to get it fixed.

By the way, if you really are missing both ways, you have alignment/swing/timing opportunities!

Kosela started the approach and threw the dead flush strike that would slow down the internet for a bit. After the 36th strike carried and his 83 rd 300 game was official, Kosela dropped into a crouch, then to one knee as well wishers walked on the approach to congratulate the latest Mr. 900.
"I wish everyone can feel the joy of doing something on this scale. Even now a couple of weeks later, I still can't believe this happened to me.'

Kosela had 80 perfect games and a personal high series of 858 until that fateful Sunday
afternoon of March 13, 2022 Despite all those, he had back-to-back 300's only once before, never the
first two games of a series.
The Roto Grip and national Logo Infusion staffer heard from many in the industry and many people he hadn't heard from in years, including former Open Championships teammate, fellow yinzer, and friend of the column John Burkett.

Stephen Kosela summed it up with this point when I mentioned it is a feat some nights just putting 36 shots in the pocket but carrying that many has a different element.

The bowling community said goodbye to two names who contributed much to different portions of the industry, one national, one Houstonian.
Bill Vint was a fixture in bowling media going back to the early 1980's as press director, w riter, and editor the PBA, PWBA, USBC and its predecessor ABC. He and wife Lisa also started Chicago's most recent bowling newspaper, the Windy City Bowling News in 1991 which is when I first met them.

I am forever indebted to

Bill as he gave me my national media break twenty-five years ago. I sent a copy of the third J PA asking for an honest critique from a print media type to a broadcast media guy. It was a concept floating around in my head since the 80s, evolving into the very first Top 25 TV Bowling Moments list. What he did astounded me. He didn't give it a more formal critique per se, but instead included it in a quarterly $A B C$ publication send to all $A B C$ and WIBC Ieague bowlers. There have been five versions since, including the one in Bowlers Journal International's 100th Anniversary edition in 2013. It's not so much now but back in the day, print and electronic media types had a rivalry, sometimes not so friendly, but he broke down that barrier.

Thank you, Bill, and rest in peace.

The other is a Houston bowling legend. When I first heard about Mr. T, I knew it couldn't be the 1980's actor from "The A Team." The man I did meet and bowl against in league was tougher than nails and had a passion for what he was doing. It was easy to
