Simonsen Wins Backto-Back USBC Masters

Becomes Youngest to Five Major Titles

ALLEN PARK, MI - On Sunday afternoon, at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Mich., Anthony Simonsen etched a new chapter in his young, yet illustrious PBA career.

The 26-year-old defeated Michael Martell to win the 2023 USBC Masters, defending his title and becoming the youngest player in PBA history to win five major titles.

Six years ago, he won his first Masters title to become the PBA's youngest major champion. He then won the 2019 PBA Players Champion-



She averages around 195 with her previous high game being a 279, which she shot last year when she had the first nine strikes but left a 10-pin on the tenth.

She's a long-time bowler who is very connected to other top-flight bowlers, but to be the person on the approach going for perfection is a rare occurrence. "It's something I've always wanted to do, but I tried not to think about until after the 9th frame. I concentrated to stay in my routine, wait for the bowlers to my side to go first, then throw my shot. I actually sat down after each strike in the tenth, just to give myself some extra time," she said.

"I was shaking so bad and was so nervous on every shot, but I just tried to breathe and focus. I pured every shot, I was so proud of myself," she added.

The shaky knees and fast-beating heart make that first 300 moment so much fun, and something that you will remember forever. Christi will surely look back fondly on this one for the rest of her bowling lifetime and she will be ready when the next opportunity comes up. Congrats Christi!



Behr Breaks Through for First Regional Win at 2023 PWBA Greater Detroit Regional

ALLEN PARK, Michigan – Most bowlers will tell you that as a match comes down to the final frames, all they want is a chance.

Andrea Behr of Kettering, Ohio, found herself in that position during the final two matches of Saturday's stepladder finals at the 2023 Professional Women's Bowling Association Greater Detroit Regional at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Michigan.

Although she had never won a professional title when the day began, Behr ended it by performing like a veteran champion, downing Victoria Giardina of Shelby Township, Michigan, (224-219) in the semifinals and Jodi Woessner of Oregon, Ohio, (197-185) during the title match to collect the \$2,200 winner's check and her first PWBA Regional victory.

Behr admitted that the magnitude of what she had just accomplished hadn't yet hit her in the moments immediately following her victory; nevertheless, she knew if felt good, and she certainly hadn't forgotten what it took to get there.

"It was a grind all day, but

I caught some lucky breaks," Behr said. "My opponents left some doors open for me, and with carry on my side, I was able to take advantage. It was just amazing."

What was more amazing was the way that Behr came through and delivered the shots that she needed time and time again throughout the stepladder finals.

She trailed Woessner throughout the championship match, falling behind by 24 pins at the halfway point and still facing a 16-pin deficit with two frames remaining.

Nevertheless, Behr wouldn't give up, and when Woessner was unable to convert the 3-6-9-10 in the 10th frame, the door swung wide open.

Unwilling to let the opportunity slip away, Behr walked right through it, tripping a 4 pin for a strike on her first shot in the tenth to put herself on the brink of victory.

Needing seven pins for a tie or eight or more for the win, Behr struck on her next ball as well, giving her the title; it was the only time she led during the championship match.





The award recognizes the star qualities of a female high school senior or college student,

including accomplishments on the lanes, academic achievement and community service. Along with the prestigious honor, Heady will receive a \$6,000 scholarship as the 2023 recipient.

Heady represents all the qualities listed above as a 19-year-old college student at Stephen F. State Austin University in Nacogdoches, Texas. Heady has been at the university for two years, so one would assume she is a sophomore. While that is true athletically, Heady is actually a senior in academic standing.

That's because by the time she graduated Summa Cum Laude from Plano Senior High School, where she received both National Junior Honor **Society and National Honor** Society recognition, Heady had already taken enough advanced placement and honors classes to allow her to enter college with 39 credit hours under her belt, giving her a head start academically at SFA.

Over her first two years at SFA, she was able to shoulder enough of a college workload to become a senior. Heady has been accepted to the Overlap Program at SFA for this year's fall semester, meaning she will be in graduate school while taking her last two undergraduate classes toward her degree in Rehabilitation Services.

It's that kind of dedication and determination that helped make Heady an outstanding choice as the recipient for this award, and it was an emotional moment for Heady when she learned she had been selected.

"I was having a really bad day that day and, honestly, I cried when I got the call from USBC letting me know that I had won," said Heady. "Hearing that news just made my day so much better. Winning this award is an incredible honor because only one person wins it each year. To me, it means that all my hard work, all of the hours I've spent bowling, all of that, has added up to something pretty incredible."

Heady came to the sport a bit later than many of her peers. She first picked up a bowling ball in fifth grade and didn't start bowling in league until the summer prior to her eighth-grade year. Growing up, Heady tried other sports including soccer, basketball and track and field, but it was bowling that struck a chord with her.

"Once I picked it up, it was just fun for me," said Heady. 'When I went to bowl, it got my mind off of everything else that was going on in my life because I've always been a super-busy, super-hectic person. Bowling has such a great community of people. I was able to connect with so many different people through bowling, and I felt like that was a fun thing.

There was always like 20 people I could text and say, 'Do you want to go bowling?

Although Heady was having fun, she also worked hard, and with the help of some great coaching and a self-professed desire to "not be bad at things," she started seeing positive results.

"I bowled out of Plano Super Bowl, and they have so many great opportunities for youth bowlers and just incredible coaches," said Heady. "I took every chance I could get to work with those great coaches. My first coach was Mickie Tate, and I would stay late every Saturday after our morning league and work with him. I attribute a lot of my success to working with him in my first few years of bowling.'

Heady's successes on the lanes have been numerous. She qualified for the Junior Gold Championships each year it was conducted from 2017-2022. She won the singles title in the 2018 **Texas USBC State Tournament** and capped her high school bowling career with a team first-place finish in the 2021 Texas State Tournament.

Heady was chosen for the 2021 Dexter High School All-American Team and was a 2021 **USBC Earl Anthony Scholarship** recipient.

Jason Belmonte Wins Record-Setting Fourth Tournament of Champions Title

FAIRLAWN, OH - On the most iconic pair in bowling, lanes 27-28 at AMF Riviera Lanes in Fairlawn, Ohio, Jason Belmonte further cemented his place in PBA history.

Belmonte defeated top seed EJ Tackett to claim his fourth career Tournament of Champions title — surpassing Mike Durbin and Jason Couch for the most ever — and the 15th major championship of his

The 39-year-old prevailed in six consecutive matches on TV, defeating three former Players

of the Year, two hungry veter-

ans pursuing their first major

title and the most accomplished

under-26 player of all time. His brilliance on TV highlighted perhaps the greatest comeback of his 15-year career.

Belmonte sat in 58th after the tournament's first round and crept up to 51st after the second. With six games left of qualifying, the two-handed sensation sat 154 pins outside of the cut.

Over the final round of qualifying and three rounds of match play, Belmonte steadily rose up the leaderboard. By

tournament's end, the trophy belonged to him.

This will be one that I will remember," Belmonte said. "At any other event moving forward where I have a slow start, I can call on this event as a reminder: Wherever you are on the leaderboard, that doesn't matter anymore.

"Now it's all about how are you going to make a shot? Just you. Don't worry about everyone else. How are you going to make the shot? And if I do that, no matter how low (in the standings), if I make enough good ones, I can make a run back.

Belmonte threw urethane on the very first shot of the afternoon, which resulted in a 4-10 split. He said the 40-foot Don Johnson oil pattern broke down quickly during the few minutes between practice and competition.

"As soon as I saw that (split), I'm like 'you're going to have to start fishing and it's not going to be pretty,'" Belmonte

Belmonte switched to reactive equipment the next frame.





For the last 60 plus years, professional bowling on network television has been a tried and true ratings magnet as one of the best sports outside of the four major team sports. PGA Golf, pro wrestling and UFC fights continue to draw good numbers on network television and pay-per-view, but now there's a new kid on the block saying it is going to draw bigger ratings closer to MLB.

If you're wondering if there is a "Hold My Beer" type claim, there is. According to a piece in awfulannouncing. com, billionaire founder Major League Pickleball founder Steve Kuhn appeared on Sportico's "Sporticast" podcast posted March 14, he believes pickleball will easily be a top five sport in the next five years in terms of viewership, challenging Major League Soccer, Major League Baseball, and even the National Hockey League. The two (yes, there are two) pro pickleball associations have had television exposure in the last five years with scattered single shows on various outlets, but this is quite the claim despite no track record behind it.

But, 2023 will be different. **CBS Sports Net, The Tennis** Channel, and ESPN will air various events throughout the year, so one can see the optimism. They think they have the product, they have exposure, and they have hype.

On Sunday April 2 ESPN airs the Pickleball Slam featuring Andre Agassi, Michael Chang, John McEnroe, and Andy

Roddick featuring \$1,000,000 in prize money for these retired tennis legends.

But, comparing tennis to the smaller scale sport of pickleball isn't music to McEnroe's ears as he told host Pat McAfee on one of his wildly popular podcasts.

"I look at like, there's the NFL and then there's arena football. It's hard to imagine something small like pickleball being great on TV. It's like watching ping-pong on TV. Tough to see how that can really work. But I've had people say they started watching tennis because of pickleball. Hopefully, it'll be a win-win for both," McEnroe said.

Sure, pro pickleball may have more money than Bowlero, more networks than Bowlero, but the PBA has had and still has solid viewership numbers for years. One can have hype and some coin behind it, but does want to today's viewers want to watch? It won't take long to find out. Just ask the USFL and eSports about their disappointing television ratings.

If you think you saw a misprint in a recent PBA50 Midwest Region tournament summary, I can say with certainty you didn't. I did snag the last PBA60 check in the recent tourney outside Chicago, the site of a memorable tourney performance from years past.

Since my arthroscopically repaired left knee felt really good over the last year and have been tossing the rock well

lately, I thought I'd give it a try as a super raisin. Not only did I get a chance to catch up with some of my fellow competitors from what seems to be a very long time ago (12 years), I got a chance to hear what the latest buzz has been from what us oldsters call the 'kid's' tour. Without anything resembling a tweak or buckling, I tossed a 240, 250 and a 260ish game for a respectable showing after a four-year layoff. Another PBA50 Midwest Regional awaits later this month.

The buzz the week before the Masters was how the supply of 14-pound balls is low and 15-pound equipment is higher than normal on the PBA Players Services truck. According to a couple of the players who watched and bowled in earlier tour events said this is the premise. The last game of a seven or eight game block they are in front of the ball return hood and need to throw it harder on the drier lane. Add in players being a little tired and there is the combination. Players would sacrifice leaving solid 9-pins or two early to get those strikes back and then some the last couple of games by being able to throw it harder when needed. Among the players changing from 15 to 14 pounds was none other than Eugene McCune on the pair to my left, who bested me in my first title game appearance in 2010, and whose son Kevin won a PBA regional title last year and was runner up in 2022 PBA Rookie of the Year voting. After leaving three solid 9-pins over two games, he was muttering to himself like he always does after a stretch of what he sees as bad ball reaction despite making appropriate adjust**Just Paying** Attention **By Mark London** Mark@TheBowlingNews.net

ments. Despite being over age 50, he throws it pretty much the same as he did years ago.

Since the recent change is literally in its infancy, it is too early to tell if it will stick. A similar change was made at the start of the reactive era thirty years ago when many of us switched from 16 pound to 15 pound and also from 15 pound to 14 pound equipment. The change in the early 90s was based on a similar vein as today's premise by making sure there is deflection as the ball hits going through the rack the one, the three, the five, and then the 9-pin.


In all honesty, I had planned the comeback to PBA regional play three years ago when Liberty Lanes in Carpentersville, İllinois planned a regional for the same March weekend in 2020. That one didn't happen, just days after the start of the pandemic. What was also delayed was an interview with the then-newly appointed PBA Midwest Regional Manager Toby Contreras. Taking over for the long-time manager Rich Weber, Contreras is best known as one of the PBA Tour's most memorable one-hit wonders, demonstrating his true thankfulness to the appreciative crowd. It's a PBA telecast finish I've featured several times as a JPA Lost Classic. Next month, I'll have an interview with him

forty years after his remarkable PBA Tour victory and life since then.

This year's PBA Tournament of Champions had three shows over two nights before the championship stepladder Sunday March 19 while the USBC Masters had one show before its championship stepladder Sunday April 2. This first-time format for national television had some plusses and minuses which I'll have a breakdown including Nielsen ratings next month in the pages of TBN inside a bowling center near you.

60-Plus Years With The PBA Tournament of Champions

The PBA Tournament of Champions has been around longer than most of the aficionados of the sport. I can still remember the very first event in 1962, featuring the 25 tour-title holders dating back to the start of the PBA in 1958. It aired on the ABC television network. Joe Joseph, a bowling proprietor from Lansing, Mich., was the first winner of the tournament in a two-game, 3 player final with a 480 total. He defeated Billy Golembiewski from Detroit with a 416 total, and Carmen Salvino of Chicago with 409.

For his efforts, Joseph received a generous \$15,000 payday, which would be equivalent to about \$150,000 today. Last year's first place prize of \$100,000 went to Dominic Barrett of Great Bentley, England. The 2022 event was held at the AMF Riviera Lanes in Fairlawn, Ohio, which had played host to the event during the Firestone years from 1965 to 1994. If you're like me, you probably just assumed that the TOC had always been contested at Riviera Lanes, just a stones throw away from Firestone's world headquarters in Akron.

Surprisingly, that first TOC was held at Play Bowl in Indianapolis. In 1963 and 1964 there was no TOC. Then in 1965, Firestone stepped in to sponsor the tournament for an incredible 30-year run. Riviera Lanes was host to all of those Fairlawn events. There were many "firsts" during those thirty years, but the one that is forever etched in my mind is the "bomb threat" of 1991. It would be my first and last visit to the TOC.

Before you begin to wonder what national PBA stop I won to qualify for the Firestone that year... it didn't happen, unfortunately. I was working for American Recreation Centers (ARC) at the time, and longtime President and CEO Bob Feuchter had just retired. His replacement was Bob Crist, a "numbers cruncher" that was promoted from the position of Chief Operating Officer. Obviously, Crist was not at

all interested in attending the promotional festivities at the Firestone, so Feuchter made the suggestion to ask me about attending the event.

What a tremendous week! It was an honor rubbing elbows with all those champions. The culmination of the week's festivities was the televised finals on Saturday. While we were waiting for the show to begin during the players last one hour warmup, an announcement came over the public address system by Sergeant David Graham of the Fairlawn Police Department to evacuate the building.

There was an eerie calm among everyone as we began an organized two-by-two exit out of the building. I remember walking across the street and standing under a blossoming apple tree that reminded me of home in Sebastopol, Calif., the "Gravenstein Apple Capital of the World." While we were waiting, we discovered that there had been an actual bomb the previous week at the PBA stop in Windsor Locks, Conn., that had been detonated.

After a little more than one hour, the all clear was given and everyone began to return to the building. The police and firemen were so efficient in their duties, and like everyone else, I just followed the herd back into the building. You can even see me on the youtube video below, as Nelson Burton Jr. gives the all clear and informs the television audience that the action is about to get underway. I'm the tall, slender man from the left side of the screen in a gray suit, at the 3:33 mark of the video:

What's really amazing is that not one spectator left! Everyone returned to the telecast in which David Ozio defeated Amleto Monacelli, $236\hbox{-}203, to claim the $50,000$ first prize. Firestone would continue to sponsor the TOC for another three years. Since then, a number of different sponsors have carried on the tradition of the event, including General

Tire, Brunswick, Dexter, H & R Block, Barbasol, and Kia.

Part of the luster of the Tournament of Champions was lost when the U.S. Open began offering huge prize funds of more than \$500,000 courtesy of Seagram's Coolers, with a nifty \$100,000 on top. But the TOC would return about 25 years later, in 2011, with a \$250,000 prize for 1st place. Pete Weber, in an article from the Las Vegas Review-Journal, said that he was looking forward to the event. "I always imagined we'd bowl for that much money, but I didn't expect it now, during a recession," said Weber.
There are so many other

notable moments since that first TOC in 1962. One came in 1967, when Jack Biondolillo of Houston rolled the first nationally broadcast 300 game on live network television. Once again, I can remember the moment so well, as I was bowling in an afternoon junior bowling league at Continental Lanes in Santa Rosa, California. My friends and I would roll our frame, and then race back to the bar entrance to watch Biondolillo as he continued his quest for a perfect game and a \$10.000 bonus.

Perhaps the most famous moment in all of professional bowling occurred a few years later at the 1970 TOC, when Don Johnson rolled a 299 game to defeat Dick Ritger with an equally impressive 268. Johnson left a "ringing" 10 pin, and fell to the floor in disbelief. The photo of Johnson lying face first on the approach was featured in almost every sports section of every news-

Playing Deep but not Wide

Let's say you need to play 4th arrow. Move your feet toward the ball return to about 30 and ever, ever so slightly turn toward the 10 pin and "feel" the 4th arrow is in the middle of your body, intersecting your sternum or nose. Now don't go crazy! I know that doesn't make a lot of sense. After all, the ball is not in the middle of your body. Wouldn't that alignment have you walk away from your shot to get the ball lined up with the target? Well, it doesn't for most people.

If the line you're playing inside is tight (you can't miss left and you can't miss right), try this trick. What I'm about

to describe may sound like you are torquing at the waist but for shots where you need to be on 19 at the arrows and go no farther right than 17, for example, it works.

Stand on 28 or 29 and face the 3 pin. That's a very slight angle for your body. Be sure your navel is pointed toward the 3 pin. Without rotating your hips, point your sternum toward the 2 pin.

You wouldn't be playing 19 to 17 if you had a better carry angle, so 15 must be out of bounds. Having your upper body square to the pins will make you feel that outside of 15 is out-of-bounds. That's a good thing since it is.

Be sure you are not lined up too far left. This won't work if you are. In the example above of playing 19 to 17, your feet

would be about 28, certainly no farther left than 30, depending on how broad your shoulders

It is absolutely amazing how accurate you can be and how the need to stand far left is eliminated when playing deep and using this method of targeting. It will keep you from unintentionally exploring the out-of-bounds.

It may even work for you when playing down the boards, although I have not seen it be as effective as when playing inside. It will help keep your armswing in line and the ball close to your ankle (an outstanding idea). This method is also very effective for crosslane spare shooting. If it doesn't work, what's going to happen? You might miss left or right. You're already doing that...

"I've been in match-play situations before, so I know that when the ball is in my court, I have to take advantage," Behr said. "I just try to stay calm and execute."

In hindsight, maybe it should have been easy for Behr to stay calm and believe that she could pull off the come-from-behind victory over Woessner. After all, she had just done the very same thing against Giardina during the semifinals.

Giardina, who rolled the highest game of the tournament by shooting 299 during Game 2 of qualifying, jumped out to an early lead and seemed destined to eliminate Behr as their semifinal match moved toward the final frames.

However, when Giardina was unable to convert the bucket (2-4-5-8) in the ninth and was saddled with a pocket 7-10 split on her second ball in the tenth, Behr suddenly had a chance to win. She came through in fine fashion, delivering a double and nine to complete the comeback and move on to the title match.

Behr opened the stepladder finals by taking down No. 4 seed Alexis Runk of Milton, Pennsylvania, by a score of 211-203.

Saturday's victory not only earned Behr a big check and a fancy trophy, but it also earned her a berth in the 2023 PWBA Regional Showdown, which will be held in December.

The field at the Regional Showdown will feature 16 players. Each regional champion in 2023 will automatically be seeded into match play at the event while the rest of the field will be determined through an eight-game qualifying round that will be open to all PWBA Regional-eligible bowlers.

The 16 players will compete in round-robin match play before the field is cut to the final four bowlers for the stepladder finals. The winner of the Regional Showdown will receive paid entries into all singles events on the 2024 PWBA National Tour schedule.

He never looked back, rattling off wins against Jason Sterner and Matt Ögle.

Those wins ensured the podium of the 2023 TOC would be Belmonte, Anthony Simonsen and EJ Tackett. Norm Duke, calling the tournament in the broadcast booth, described the trio as the world's three best players.

"You'd have to go back a long way to find a major championship show without one of us on the show," Belmonte said.

At least one member of the trio has made the championship round in 32 of 40 majors since 2015 (Simonsen's first full season on Tour).

Simonsen, who many people on Tour describe as the most creative player on the planet, opted to about two arrows right of Belmonte in the semifinal; he was one of the few brave enough to play that zone across all four shows. While the 26-year-old made quality shots, the pins did not cooperate.

The title match set up a rematch of the 2019 TOC championship between Belmonte and Tackett. The latter took the opposite path to the title match, leading the tournament wire to

Tackett missed a pair of 3-6-10 spares, which he had been perfect on all week, in the first and sixth frames.

"If I make both of those, I don't know if the match changes a bunch, but it definitely puts a little bit more pressure on Jason," Tackett said. "It's been a great year so far. I had another opportunity to win another major championship. I threw some good shots, just failed a little bit at spare shooting and I have to chalk the loss up to that."

While Belmonte avoided the early friction that doomed Tackett's comeback attempt, he said he could feel the transition coming his way.

"I think he saw what I was going to see if the match went just a little longer," Belmonte said. "He was a little further right than I was, but I knew that my ball was going to do what he's doing. I just had to hope I can get through nine

Four years after Belmonte defeated Tackett to win his record-tying 10th career major, Belmonte won No. 15 on the very same pair of lanes.

You walk into (Riviera) and you get that 'Field of Dreams' feeling," Belmonte said. "You just gotta close your eyes for a second and think about who's walked through those doors and take that in.

'I don't know how I can truly describe how proud of myself I am and how excited I

ship, 2022 U.S. Open and 2022 Masters; the youngest to win at every turn.

With this latest title, Simonsen also became the third three-time Masters champion, joining Mike Aulby (1989, '95, 98) and Jason Belmonte (2013-

Simonsen caught fire late in the match play rounds, averaging over 263 for his last eight games before the championship round.

He beat Martell in the final match of the winners bracket to earn the No. 1 seed, which ensured Simonsen would need to be beaten twice on TV. He struck on 34 of 36 possible shots in that match, shooting 300 and 845 for the three-game

The two-hander refused to let the match reach a second game, seizing the title with a 243-222 victory.

Martell, who was making his PBA Tour television debut, knew he could not give Simonsen an inch. After converting a pair of 6-pins, Martell split in the seventh frame, giving

Simonsen all the room he needed.

The 25-year-old from Brooklyn, N.Y. defeated Kyle Sherman in the semifinal to set up a rematch. Martell shook off some jitters in the first two frames, then struck in the ninth and 10th to shut out Sherman and advance to his first career championship match.

"There is nothing better than stepping up on television knowing you need a hit and getting the hit," Martell said. "I have a lot of belief in the fact that I can get back here. This is just the beginning of what I hope will be the rest of a special season."

The scoring pace slowed down in the semifinal, following a trend seen throughout the week. The 46-foot oil pattern would often be conducive to high scores, but transition could make them tricky in a

Sherman, just as he did Friday night, started hot in the opening match against Sean Rash. He threw 10 strikes to take down the veteran, 258-199.

Rash, making his first Masters telecast since winning the event in 2007, fought to stay in the match. However, a 4-9

split in the ninth frame ended his comeback attempt.

At the Masters, Simonsen sought to defend a title for the first time in his career. He not only repeated as Masters champion, but also won the second straight PBA Tour event held at Thunderbowl.

"As soon as I walk in, it feels like home," Simonsen said. "With all the history the inside (Thunderbowl), not just the building but the arena itself, it's pretty special to come in here. I had the last win on the old lane surface. I have the first one on the new lane surface. Being a little bowling nerd, that'll be a little cool checkmark for me."

plishments, Heady cites a win in the 2020 Amateur Bowlers Tour of Texas event at the age of 17 as her most memorable bowling achievement prior to college.

"It was an adult tournament, and it was the first adult tournament I had ever bowled," said Heady. "I shot 277 to win and I had all these adults standing around watching me and cheering me on. It was during winter break of my senior year, and I was the only youth bowler in the field and the only woman to make the finals. It was just super cool and very memorable to me having all those adult bowlers cheering for me."

Her time in the sport of bowling hasn't all been spent on the lanes. Heady also served as a board member with the Greater Dallas USBC from 2017-2020.

"I was the only younger person on the board, so I felt like I stuck out like a sore thumb at our meetings" recalled Heady. "But the board did a really good job of integrating me into everything they did and allowed

me to use my voice and listened to my point of view, which was sometimes a different outlook from theirs since I was a youth bowler."

Success in the classroom and on the lanes has followed Heady to SFA. In addition to the accelerated pace with which she will achieve her undergraduate degree, Heady has earned a place on the President's Honor Roll (4.0 GPA) from 2021 to the present.


On the lanes, Heady was part of the 2022 Intercollegiate Team Championships national championship team and the 2022 NCAA national runner-up team.

"When I got to SFA, I had so many things about my game that I wanted to work on and needed to work on," said Heady. "We have such a great team," said Heady. "I've found some of my closest friends on this team, and they're just so supportive of me. We're serious, but we can also joke around in practice, and you can be yourself. That's refreshing and important to me."

In addition to her exemplary performance in the classroom and on the lanes, Heady has strived to complete 30 hours or more of community service each year, which has included involvement in organizations like the Plano Heritage Farmstead Museum, North Texas

Food Bank and filling bags for "The School Supply Project" which benefits the Children's Advocacy Center of Collin County.

Heady also serves as a volunteer intern for the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Council of Deep East Texas in Nacogdoches.

"I specifically want to be a substance abuse counselor, so this is an incredible experience," said Heady. "I get the chance to work with so many people from so many backgrounds who are dealing with these issues. Heady will be recognized in April during the 2023 USBC Convention at South Point Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas.

This year's award ceremony, which includes a variety of awards for youth and adult bowlers, will take place during the 2023 USBC Annual Meeting on April 26 and 27.


