Julia Bond Wins First Major at USBC Queens

RENO, Nev. - Julia Bond of Aurora, Illinois, capped a dominating performance this week at the National Bowling Stadium by winning her first major championship Tuesday at the 2021 United States Bowling

Congress Queens.

The 25-year-old right-hander went undefeated through the double-elimination bracket and recorded her second win of the 2021 Professional Women's **Bowling Association Tour** season by defeating 2011 USBC Queens champion Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, California, in the title match, 238-154.

Bond claimed the coveted tiara and the \$20,000 first-place prize. Parkin earned \$10,000 for her runner-up finish.


The finals of the 2021 Queens were broadcast on BowlTV.com.

"This feels great," said Bond, who won her first career national tour title in January at the PWBA Hall of Fame Classic. "It's a very validating feeling to see that I'm on the right path, making good choices and learning. That's been the goal since my rookie season, and this win is very special."

Bond, who had to be defeated twice as the top seed for the stepladder finals in the true double-elimination format, quickly took the lead in the title match, with Parkin opening in

Waxahachie, Texas, (May 24, 2021) - Dylan Macon, a former PBA member from Lubbock, Texas, built a 110 pin lead going into the final game position round, then held off Tim Crites' late charge, and

won the third annual PBA Waxahachie Southwest Challenge Sunday at Hilltop Lanes.

Macon finished Saturday's eight game qualifying round in 19th place, then rebounded averaging over 254 in the

DENTON, TX - We had a full field of 80 bowlers over 60 years of age at University Lanes in Denton, Saturday, May 22. 26 of them were over 70.

Bill Nichols was leading after 8 games of qualifying on Saturday. After 4 more games on Sunday morning, he had dropped to 3rd place going into the match play finals.

He hung around in the top 3 spots during the 8 games of match play winning 4 of his first 7 matches and was 5 pins behind CK Moore going into the final match.

He dominated that match 254-183 to win his 6th SASBA title and \$1,100. Bill was the only 70 year old in the 16 man finals.

CK hung on for 2nd for \$900, Mery Parrish and Rodney Black tied for 3rd/4th and collected \$725 and Pete Thomas

Zavala Claims Second Title of 2021 Season at PWBA BVL Open

FARMINGDALE, N.Y. – Stephanie Zavala of Downey, California, celebrated her 25th birthday Saturday by raising the trophy at the 2021 Professional Women's Bowling Association BVL Open.

Zavala claimed her second title in just five events as a professional by defeating Jordan Richard of Maumee, Ohio, at Farmingdale Lanes, 228-204.

The championship round was broadcast live on BowlTV. com, with Zavala earning her second \$10,000 first-place check in May. She won the PWBA Greater Cleveland Open three weeks ago, defeating Bryanna Coté in the title match, 247-216.

Zavala nearly recorded a wire-to-wire victory at the BVL Open. She was at the top of the standings for 22 of the 24 qualifying games heading into the stepladder finals and finished qualifying with a 229-pin lead over the next closest competitor, Breanna Clemmer of Clover, South Carolina, to earn the top seed for the stepladder.

"If someone told me I'd

already have two titles, I'd say they were crazy, but it sounds like a dream come true," said Zavala, a rookie on the PWBA Tour this season. "It's one I would have wanted to come true, so I'm glad it did. This was the best birthday present I could have given myself and my grandpa. We share a birthday, and he passed away in November, so it was the first one I've had to spend without him. It was tough waking up this morning knowing that, but I knew he was watching over me all weekend and that he couldn't be prouder.'

Zavala got out to an early lead in the title match, rolling four consecutive strikes after a first-frame spare, while Richard stayed clean but was unable to double.

A 7-10 split in the sixth frame momentarily slowed Zavala, but she responded with three more strikes to set up the 10th frame and the opportunity to shut out Richard, who had found some late momentum with a pair of strikes in the eighth and ninth frames.

Needing a mark to lock up the victory, Zavala left, and converted, the 3-6-9-10 combination and then knocked over six pins on her fill ball to put it out of reach.

"I definitely took a few extra breaths before shooting at that spare," said Zavala, who bowled collegiately at Sam Houston State University. "It's not fun or my favorite, however, I do leave a lot of them and have had plenty of practice shooting at it. I wanted to take my time, relax and give it a shot."

Zavala also was the top seed at the Greater Cleveland Open, but noted that some of the initial nerves she felt at Yorktown Lanes against Coté were not present at Farmingdale Lanes as she waited for her opportunity to bowl for the title.

Despite out-averaging the field by nearly 10 pins during qualifying, she continued to push herself to stay ahead of the transition on the event's 40-foot lane condition.

"The scores weren't very high this week in qualifying, and I found success pretty early," Zavala said. "For me, though, I wanted to keep my head down and keep working. I knew I couldn't get too comfortable or complacent and always had to stay on top of the moves. I kept working hard and kept making good shots."

Richard, a two-time PWBA Tour champion, advanced to the title match with a near-perfect performance in the semifinal against Clemmer. The 2018 PWBA Rookie of the Year rolled 10 consecutive strikes, before leaving the 4-6-7-10 split on her 11th delivery. She defeated Clemmer, 284-225.



LAS VEGAS, NV - Colorado bowler takes Regular Singles lead at 2021 USBC Open Championships

Rick Schafer of Arvada, Colorado, stepped up in his final frame needing a strike for the first 800 series of the 2021 United States Bowling Congress Open Championships in Las Vegas.

The 43-year-old right-hander already had locked up the Regular Singles lead by throwing nine consecutive strikes to start his final game at the South Point Bowling Center, so the 10th frame offered a whole different kind of pressure, as he looked to become the 37th bowler in history with a 300 game and 800 series on the championship lanes.

A 10 pin on his first offering denied him both. He finished with games of 243, 277 and 279 for a 799 series, the second of the week, but it was enough to move past Zachary Woelfel of Burlington, Wisconsin, who took the top spot in Regular Singles on May 22 with a 768 series that included the fifth of the tournament's six 299 games.

The week's other 799 was rolled by former Team USA member Wesley Low Jr. of Palmdale, California, during his team event at the South Point Bowling Plaza on May 22.

Schafer's 22nd USBC Open Championships appearance also included sets of 673 in team and 630 in doubles for a career-best 2,102 all-events total, which is fifth in Regular All-Events this year. Team USA member Michael Martell of Brooklyn, New York, leads with 2.194.

Though Woelfel, a 25-yearold right-hander, no longer is the player to beat individually, he still gets to do some score watching with his K and J Finishing 1 teammates as the leaders in Team All-Events with a 9,927 five-player total.

With his 622 series in team and 601 in doubles, Woelfel finished with a career-best 1,991 all-events score. He was joined in the effort by Nick Kruml (2,098), Team USA and USBC Board member Nick Pate (2,035), Christopher Wiley (1,986) and Ryne Greenwood (1,817).

Striking Edge Pro Shop of Wausau, Wisconsin, previously held the lead in Team All-Events with 9,831.

Five bowlers roll perfect games at South Point

Five bowlers rolled perfect games this week at the 2021 USBC Open Championships, bringing the total for the year to an even dozen.

Brent Neumann of Maple Grove, Minnesota, was the first to achieve the feat, doing so in his team event May 19 at the South Point Bowling Plaza. The 33-year-old right-hander's performance included games of 217 and 182 for a 699 series.

Michael Clark, a righthander who celebrated his 49th birthday while in Las Vegas, also found perfection during the team event, doing so May



20 between games of 188 and 235 for a 723 series.

His effort helped Turbo Grips 2 of Chesterfield Township, Michigan, to a 3,292 team total, which is fifth in Regular Team. The Bowlers Shoppe 1 of St. Louis leads with 3,352.

Edward Burbo, a 37-year-old right-hander from Belleville, Michigan, added his name to the list May 22 during doubles, tossing games of 209, 236 and 300 for a 745 series. He teamed with William Jackson of Westland, Michigan, for a 1,276 doubles total.

On May 23, Low was able to take advantage of a second shot at the record book, and the 24-year-old left-hander got the job done, rolling the event's 11th perfect game on the way to a 720 singles series and 2,130 all-events total. He is third in Regular All-Events.

The week's final 300 belongs to Matthew Priore of North Arlington, New Jersey, who hadn't bowled in nearly a year and a half, and it showed in his first two games May 23 at the Bowling Plaza.

His team event marked the first bowling he'd done since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the 28-year-old right-hander opened with games of 143 and 135, before things fell into place. He finished his return to the lanes with a 578 series.

Sharon Powers of Lakewood, Colorado, started her appearance at the 2021 United States Bowling Congress Women's Championships by being recognized as a tournament champion for the first time after helping Powerhouse claim the Diamond Team title in 2019.

She left the National Bowling Stadium with her name being added to the record book again, along with the chance to win a gemstone trophy for a second consecutive tournament, after rolling an 801 series May 21 to take the lead in Diamond Singles.

Powers, who made her 45th consecutive USBC Women's Championships appearance, fired games of 289, 268 and 244 to become the 10th bowler to achieve an 800 series at the tournament.

After leaving a 10 pin to start her final frame of singles, the 64-year-old right-hander needed to convert the spare to take the top spot from England's Verity Crawley, who held the lead with 793.

Powers made the spare and added seven pins on her fill ball to become the second bowler this year to roll an 800 series at the Women's Cham-

"I didn't know what the lead was, so all I wanted to do was make the 10 pin. I'm thrilled to accomplish this."

Powers captured her first Women's Championships title in Wichita, Kansas, in 2019 alongside three-time champion Christine Gill, Michelle Maly and Debbie McMullen with a 2,767 total.

The Greater Denver and Colorado State USBC Hall of Famer's singles score is the second highest in the 101 editions of the tournament, and she's excited to see if she can pick up a second title at the national event.

Michelle Feldman of Auburn, New York, won Classic Singles in 2009 with an 816 series, also rolled at the 78-lane NBS.

"For all of these years, I wanted a title," said Powers, who added sets of 696 in team and 615 in doubles for a 2,112 all-events total. "To win again would just be a dream come true."

The Diamond Division features bowlers with entering averages of 175 and above.



Spectators will be allowed to watch in person from the practice session through the television finals. The PBA shows added cheering sounds to help with the telecasts, not necessarily the participants and staff as you

read in JPA last fall. The next round of shows this summer. the King of the Lanes from Charlie Mitchell's Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine will have its usual boisterous crowd and the PBA Tour Finals in Allen Park, Michigan, will allow spectators as well.

The final batch of pandemic era shows are the USBC collegiate singles and team national championship shows (Intercollegiate Singles Championships, ISC, and Intercollegiate Team

Championships, ITC) from Wyoming, Michigan, which wrap up this week airing on CBS Sports Network. A couple of things you have seen and heard on these shows we may or may not see or hear again.

Once you got past the eerie silence with the lack of fans cheering, the college telecasts became more of what is known in the industry as cameraman's sports, where the skill of the camera operators comes more evident. Tighter shots of bowlers and coaches require more camera movement when people are moving and walking. Without crowd noise, in a way it's easier to commentate getting into more detail, which is right in Kelly Kulick's wheelhouse. Plus, the announcers don't have to feel the need to talk over the crowd noise. It reminded me of radio play by play, which offers more words to paint the picture.

An advantage of a taped broadcast is the show producer being able to insert video with a voice over describing next year's site, in this case Indianapolis.

Of course, the lack of crowd noise and mandatory mask wearing will be a moot point next season, as many pandemic restrictions will be greatly relaxed. Don't get me wrong about pointing out these things, but at least we had all three college championships this year, NCAA, ISC, and ITC.

This time two years ago in these pages, Jenny Wonders told her rollercoaster story of surviving a series live threatening health issues on her way to achieve something her dad did five time in his USBC Hall of Fame career, winning five Eagles at the ABC (now USBC Open) Championships in the



I Don't Feel Any Different On The Inside...

A couple of the newspaper publishers and editors that I work with were quite interested in my installment from last week, The More Things Change, The More They Stay The Same. They were intrigued by my recounting of experiences that took place almost 50 years ago and clamoring for more.

I suddenly realized that I have become the oldest man in the room! It reminded me of special times that I spent with my Grandma when I was very young. She would tell me often of how much she enjoyed being with me because I made her feel young. One of her favorite lines was, "I don't feel any different on the inside... I just look different on the outside." As I approach my 70th birthday, I now know what she meant!

Those early days on the PBA Tour were an eye opener for me, in terms of physical, cultural and mental stress. The physical torment that the players go through each week is something over which I still marvel. To be able to condense an entire league season into one week, and then repeat that process on a weekly basis over an entire year, is something that makes my sciatica nerve twinge

Walter Ray Williams Jr. is the record holder for number of games rolled, adding to his other phenomenal accomplishments on the PBA Tour. In 1993 he rolled an astonishing 1,300 games while competing in tournaments. That's the equivalent of almost 15 seasons of league bowling... in one year! It doesn't stop there. In his 40 years on the PBA Tour, Walter Ray has competed in 1,038 tournaments and made the match play finals in 582 of those events.

So let's just assume that all of those events were 18 game qualifying tournaments for the purposes of simplification. That's 1,038 x 18 = 18,684 games. We will need to add another 14 games for the longer 32 game format, so let's say conservatively that will add another 1,450 games (roughly 10% of the 1,038 tournaments that he entered). Then you have the match play, in which he


qualified 582 times. That's 582 x 24 = 13,968 games. And then you have the televised matches, practice sessions, and Pro-Am events... not to mention all of the regional tournaments that he must have entered!

Just looking at the national tournament games alone, Walter Ray has logged more than 35,000 games in his career. Give this guy the Iron Man of the Century Award! I'm sure that he must have suffered some ailments over the years, but I expect that his body would be of interest to the American Chiropractic Association. Perhaps the Horseshoe competition, where he is a nine-time World Horseshoe Pitching Champion, provides some sort of counter-balance to the exertion applied during the PBA events, although the motion appears to be the same in both sports.

Along with all of those physical games, there's a lot of cultural "games" that were evident at every tournament. In addition to the obvious lifestyle changes, you also had to deal with a wide variety of personalities, and equipment considerations each week. During my research of last weeks article, I was surprised to learn that Mark Roth experimented with "soakers" during the early to mid-1970's. The equipment change was made manifest by the change in oiling procedures and surfaces on the lanes brought about primarily by fire insurance regulations.

In a 1979 article in The New York Times ("Kingpin of the Bowling Tour"), Mark Roth conceded, "I used to soak the ball to make it hook more. It made the ball like a sponge." Now if you know the style of Mr. Roth, you would have to say that there is no one on this planet that required the added assist from soaking a ball in Methyl Ethyl Ketone. The compound, also referred to as M.E.K., is used primarily as a solvent, and in the manufacture of synthetic rubber. Even though Methyl Ethyl Ketone is known to occur naturally, its manufacture and sale has been banned in some states, most notably California (OEHHA - CA.gov).

I often wondered how Don

McCune, the obscure professional bowler from Munster, Indiana, discovered this unique method of softening a bowling ball. While researching M.E.K., acetone and other chemicals on the internet, I stumbled upon an article in Sports Illustrated from 1973, "Now He's Throwing a Wet One, Too," in which McCune explains reaching out to a chemist friend of his to find out what solvents might soften the surface of a bowling ball. The rest, as the saying

goes, is history.

The cultural "games" can also have a profound effect on your mental well-being. It's a dog-eat-dog world with a mental stress placed upon the players that is so prevalent that you can cut it with a knife. There's no better example than the following short video from 1983 that I discovered when researching for the Chief Halftown article. Just take a listen and watch the facial expressions of Mark Roth. Harry Smith, Jay Robinson, Mike Durbin and Sam Zurich to understand the hardships that go with living as a man without a home on the PBA

Matching up Maximum energy to the pins in a score producing way

You've heard people talk about not being matched up; that's why they lost or didn't score well or whatever. They're likely telling the truth. Matching up is paramount to success in bowling. It's the transference of energy from you to the ball to the pins - matching your rev rate and speed to each other AND to what the lane wants. First I'll describe what I mean and then we'll talk about how to recognize it and produce it.

A marriage made in bowling

The term rev rate in bowling refers to how many times a ball revolves as it goes down the lane. That's different than rotation. When you hear about rev rate, you hear numbers like 420 or 550, for example. That means the bowler's shot had

ages 195 on house shot and 170 on "Sport." Her high game and series are 299 and 736. 550 revolutions per minute. Well, that's pretty silly. The ball is not on the lane a minute. It's more like 2-3 seconds.

It would be more accurate to say the bowler had 9 revs or 14 revs or 16 revs or whatever. That is not, however, how we talk. We talk about revs in terms of minutes (rpm), even though the ball is only on the lane a fraction of that time.

The other part of the marriage is speed. You'll hear talk about ball speed being 19.5 miles per hour. The ball is not on the lane an hour. If it is on the lane two seconds like I mentioned before, that translates to 20.45 miles per hour and 2.4 seconds would be 17.05 mph.

Just as a point of information, if your center's scoring system provides a speed readout, know this. That speed is calculated just in front of

the pins. That is not the speed off your hand. (By the way, ball speed readings on the PBA telecasts are taken throughout the shot). We used to think the ball loses 2 - 2.5 mph between when you let it go and when the reading is taken. More current scientific data has the numbers at 3-4 mph. So, if the reading says 15.5, you probably were at 18.5 or more when you let it go.

Please don't take those numbers to the bank. You don't know how or when the speed indicators were calibrated, so you can't know if they are accurate. What matters is how consistently you repeat the speed, not the actual numbers.

If one shot is 16.6 and the next is 18.4 (on the same lane), be concerned. Unless you really intended to massively increase your speed on that second shot, that variation is too great to see similar ball motion. The closer together your speed numbers are, the more similar your ball reaction can be and the more accurate your read. The more accurate your read, the better your adjustment. Visit me at strikeability.com!

Sapphire Team features fourplayer teams with a combined entering average of 544 and below.


A look ahead

week," said Parkin, who made her third championship-round appearance of the season and collected her second runner-up finish of 2021. "Even before the final match, I had grabbed another bag because I was anticipating what was going to happen. Unfortunately, I made the wrong move to start and didn't figure them out quick enough.

The 39-year-old right-hander took away a lot of positives from her time at the NBS, knowing she made some strides in her execution during the week.

"I'm extremely proud of my execution," said Parkin, a 12-time Team USA member. "Starting the week, I didn't really have a great look. I ended up drilling a few bowling balls, which made a big difference, and I feel, especially yesterday, I physically executed really well during the matches. I'm very proud with how I bowled this week."

Tuesday's stepladder finals started with Crawley defeating Latvia's Diana Žavjalova, 197-172.

Zavjalova was looking to become the third player to win three Queens titles after capturing the tiara in 2013 and 2017. USBC and PWBA Hall of Famers Mildred Ignizio (1967, 1970, 1971) and Wendy Macpherson (1988, 2000, 2003) are the only players to win the event three times.

The 2021 event started with 110 competitors. After 15 games of qualifying over three days, the top 63 players and Ukraine's Dasha Kovalova, who was guaranteed a spot in the bracket as the defending champion, advanced to match play.

Kovalova won two matches at the NBS before she was eliminated Monday by Josie Barnes of Hermitage, Tennessee, 629-609. Kovalova finished tied for 25th place.

The PWBA Tour season will resume May 27-29 at the PWBA BVL Open in Farmingdale, New York.

Doubles & Singles Squad Times Adjusted for Remainder of 2021 USBC **Open Championships**

LAS VEGAS - The remainder of the 2021 United States Bowling Congress Open Championships will have an adjusted squad schedule for doubles and singles, which are being held at the South Point Bowling Center.

Beginning June 1, the 1 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. doubles/singles squads will push back to 1:45 p.m. and 9 p.m. The day's other squads, 7 a.m., 10 a.m. and 5

p.m., will remain as previously scheduled.

The change will continue through the end of the 2021 USBC Open Championships on July 18. Competition at the 79day tournament began May 1.

All team captains will be notified by email, along with the traditional schedule notices sent out prior to their competition



dates. Captains who already have received notices will be sent updated versions reflecting the adjusted times

Information collected during the first four weeks of competition at the South Point **Bowling Center has indicated** that doubles and singles squads are running an average of nearly 30 minutes longer than the allotted two hours and 30

The change, which only pertains to doubles and singles competition, is being made to be more efficient with everyone's time and minimize any inconvenience to the competitors.

All squads of team competi-

tion, being held at the South Point Bowling Plaza, will remain at their original times - 8 a.m., noon, 4 p.m. and 8 p.m. - with bowlers having three hours and 20 minutes to complete their three games.

Bowler feedback during the first few weeks of the tourna ment has indicated that the bowlers are as excited to be back on the lanes competing as we are to have them, and we appreciate everyone's patience with some of the unique aspects of running a tournament of this size this year," USBC **Executive Director Chad Mur**phy said. "We've kept an eye on some of those things and feel that adjusting the squad times will go a long way toward the quality of the overall experience for our bowlers.'

The schedule for this year's Open Championships was created based on running the

event across two venues for the first time in tournament history, along with limiting team competition to one team per pair of lanes.

When the event returns to Las Vegas and South Point in 2022, all bowling will take place at the 60-lane Bowling Plaza, with team squads at 1 p.m. and 8 p.m. and doubles/ singles squads at 7 a.m., 10 a.m., 5 p.m. and 11:45 p.m.

Team competition in 2022 is expected to again include two teams per pair of lanes, while doubles/singles will continue to feature four bowlers per pair, where they'll remain for all six games.



The JBT will return to Tenpins & More twice more this season, with the Youth New Mexico Open on September 25-26, then the regular "doubleheader" on December 18-19.


